

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN®) is responsible to its members, the boards of nursing in the U.S. and its member board territories, for the preparation of psychometrically sound and legally defensible licensure examinations. The periodic performance of practice analysis (i.e., job analysis) studies assists NCSBN in evaluating the validity of the test plan that guides content distribution of the licensure examinations. Because the U.S. health care industry is rapidly changing, practice analysis studies are traditionally conducted by NCSBN on a three-year cycle.

The 2013-2014 NCSBN Strategic Practice Analysis highlighted the increasingly complex decisions newly licensed nurses make during the course of patient care. These increasingly complex decisions often require the use of clinical judgment to support patient safety. NCSBN has conducted several years of research and study to understand and isolate the individual factors that contribute to the process of nursing clinical judgment. When the concept of clinical judgment is explored relative to nursing, it is expected the individual contributing factors to clinical judgment will closely align with the performance of activities involved in the delivery of nursing care. In other words, those contributing factors align with nursing behavior and therefore remain an important underpinning in the nursing decision making process. As a result, NCSBN wanted to understand the relevance of clinical judgment in the performance of entry-level activities. The 2021 RN Practice Analysis includes survey questions to gather data to explore this subject. The following clinical judgment definition was provided to survey responders:

 Clinical judgment is defined as the observed outcome of critical thinking and decision making. It is an iterative process that uses nursing knowledge to observe and assess presenting situations, identify a prioritized client concern, and generate the best possible evidence-based solutions in order to deliver safe client care. A number of steps are necessary to perform an analysis of newly licensed registered nurse (RN) practice. A panel of subject matter experts was assembled, a list of RN activities was created and incorporated into a survey that was sent to a randomly drawn sample of newly licensed registered nurses, and data was collected and analyzed.

Methodology Reviewers

Three methodology reviewers have been chosen for their expertise in practice/job analysis and certification exam development as reviewers of the methodologies and procedures for NCSBN's previous practice analysis studies. All three reviewers have indicated in the past that this methodology was psychometrically sound, legally defensible and in compliance with industry standards for practice analyses. After a sound methodology has been validated and approved by an external panel of subject matter experts (SMEs) in the area of psychometrics and practice analysis methodologies, that methodology will remain in effect until new procedures or methodologies are suggested. Should substantial changes to the methodology occur in future practice analyses, NCSBN Examinations staff shall ensure that a thorough review of the methodology is undertaken by external SMEs.

Panel of Subject Matter Experts (SMEs)

A panel of 13 RNs was assembled to assist with the practice analysis. Panel members worked with, educated, and/or supervised the practice of RNs within their first twelve months of practice or were themselves newly licensed RNs. Panel members represented geographic NCSBN areas of the U.S. territories/jurisdictions using the NCLEX for licensure decisions, all major nursing specialties, and varied practice settings.

The panel used the current test plan category structure describing the types of activities performed by newly licensed RNs and developed a list of activities performed within each category of the structure.

Survey Development

A total of 146 nursing activity statements were incorporated into the practice analysis survey. The survey also included questions about the nurses' practice settings, past experiences and demographics. Six forms of the survey were created to reduce the number of activity statements on each survey and sent via Web to a sample of newly licensed RNs. Four of the survey forms contained 24 activity statements each and two survey forms contained 25 activity statements. Except for the activity statements unique to each survey form, the surveys were identical.

Survey Process

Sample Selection

A sample of 24,000 were randomly selected from the candidates who successfully passed the NCLEX-RN® examination from April 15, 2020 through Feb. 15, 2021.

Representativeness

The sample selected for this study was proportionally equivalent to the population from which the sample was drawn with respect to each NCSBN jurisdiction.

Emailing Procedure

Six forms of the Web survey were distributed evenly among 24,000 newly licensed RNs. A five-stage emailing process was used to engage participants in the study. All potential participants were promised confidentiality with regard to their participation and their responses. The survey was conducted from April through June 2021.

Return Rates

Out of the 24,000 surveys sent, a total of 4,758 surveys were returned (801 were returned for Form 1; 859 from Form 2; 769 from Form 3; 748 from Form 4; 778 from Form 5; and 803 from Form 6). A total of 310 Web surveys were identified as undeliverable. Therefore, the adjusted return rate was 20.1%. Of the 23,690 surveys sent, 4,758 responders completed the survey. A total

of 544 individuals did not qualify for survey ratings based on one of the following reasons. Either: (a) they did not indicate having an RN license; (b) they were not currently working in the U.S.; (c) they were working less than 20 hours per week as an RN; and/or (d) they failed to answer the previous three demographic questions. After adjusting for incorrect addresses and removals, the analyzable response rate was 17.8%.

RN Practice Analysis Survey Nonresponder Study

In order to ensure the validity of the results, NCSBN conducted an email and telephone survey of nonresponders to determine if those RNs not responding would have rated the survey activity statements differently. The nonresponders rated the activity statements similar to the responders, which provides support to the validity of the survey results.

Demographics, Experiences and Practice Environments of Participants

Demographics/Past Experiences

The majority of survey responders (87.5%) indicated their gender as female. The age of responder nurses averaged 31.2 years (SD 8.9 years). Responders indicated their racial/ethnic background as follows: 65.6% White-not of Hispanic Origin, 14.1% Black or African American, 9.1% Hispanic or Latino, 7.7% Asian, 0.4% Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander, and 3.1% other.

Newly licensed RNs listed obtaining an associate degree most frequently (51.4%) as the educational preparation for initial RN licensure. The second most frequent response listed was the baccalaureate degree (41.6%).

Responders indicated working an average of 6.2 months as RNs in the U.S. and its territories. On average, RNs reported earning a nursing degree 12.3 months prior to taking the survey. Approximately 17.9% of newly licensed RNs reported previous experience as a licensed practical/vocational nurse (LPN/VN) and 45.2% reported previous experience as unlicensed assistive personnel (UAP). The average experience in those positions was 6.3 years as an LPN/VN and 3.5 years as a UAP.

Orientation

The majority of newly licensed RNs (96.0%) received some form of formal orientation. No formal orientation was reported by 4.0% and 1.2% reported having only classroom instruction or skills lab work for their orientation. The majority of newly licensed RNs reported working with an assigned preceptor (59.9%) for an average of 9.5 weeks. In the next largest group, 25.7% reported having a formal internship, which lasted an average of 12.4 weeks, while just 6.8% of responders indicated performing supervised work with clients for an average of 7.7 weeks.

Certifications Earned

In the current study, Basic Life Support (53.4%), Advanced Cardiac Life Support (29%), and Intravenous Therapy (12.2%) were the most frequently reported certifications.

Facilities

The majority of newly licensed RNs (77.3%) in this study reported working in hospitals. Only 8.8% indicated working in long-term care facilities and 9.8% indicated working in community-based or ambulatory care facilities/organizations.

Overall, the number of beds reported in hospitals or nursing homes was most commonly distributed among 100-299 beds (23.5%), 500 or more beds (20.2%), fewer than 100 beds (19.2%). Only 16.9% reported working in facilities with 300-499 beds.

The majority of newly licensed RNs (52.5%) reported working in urban or metropolitan areas, 30.4% work in suburban areas, and 17.2% work in rural areas.

Practice Settings

Most frequently, newly licensed RNs reported working in the medical/surgical (23.3%) and critical care (17.3%) settings. Some other commonly reported settings include long-term care (6.0%), rehabilitation (5.0%) and pediatrics (3.6%).

Client Health Conditions and Ages

A majority of the newly licensed RNs reported that they cared for clients with acute conditions (44.8%). The next highest percentage of responders reported caring for clients with stabilized chronic conditions (37.8%), clients with unstabilized chronic conditions (35.5%) and clients with behavioral/emotional conditions (31.2%).

In terms of age, the majority of newly licensed RNs reported caring for older adult clients aged 65 to 85 (49.1%) and/or caring for adult clients aged 18 to 64 (48.3%) on their last day of work prior to completing the survey. Newly licensed RNs also indicated caring for older adults over the age of 85 (34.4%) and pediatric clients aged 0 to 17 (11.5%). Survey responders could

select more than one client age category, resulting in a sum greater than 100%.

Shifts Worked

The shifts most commonly worked by newly licensed RNs were days (45.1%) and nights (37.9%). Only 10.9% reported working rotating shifts.

Time Spent in Different Categories of Nursing Activities

Newly licensed RNs reported spending the greatest amount of time in management of care (15%), safety and infection control (13%), and physiological adaptation (13%).

Administrative Responsibilities/Primary Administrative Position

Of the responders, 22.3% reported having administrative responsibilities and of those responders, 82.4% (a 49.5% increase since 2017) reported having a primary administrative position. RNs working in long-term care facilities were far more likely to report having administrative responsibilities than RNs working in hospitals (62.0% in long-term care compared to 14.1% in hospitals). In addition, of the RNs working in long-term care with administrative responsibilities, 85.9% (a 29.2% increase since 2017) reported having a primary administrative position. Of the RNs working in community-based settings, 37.3% reported having administrative responsibilities. Of those responders, 91.6% (a 56.9% increase since 2017) reported holding a primary administrative position.

Activity Performance Findings

Reliability

Reliability indices were calculated to assess the capability of the survey to measure the activities relevant to safe and effective practice of newly licensed RNs. Cronbach's alpha coefficients were calculated for frequency, importance and clinical judgment ratings for the survey forms. The surveys had a reliability index of

0.91 for frequency, 0.91 for importance, and 0.90 for clinical judgment ratings. These high reliability indices indicate the survey is reliably measuring the nursing activities necessary for competent RN practice.

SME Panel Validation of Survey Findings

The subject matter expert (SME) panel for the 2021 RN Practice Analysis was asked to provide independent ratings of the 146 activity statements. In general, the importance ratings of SMEs and survey responders were somewhat similar; however, responders regarded most of the activity statements as more important than the SMEs.

Applicability of Activities to Practice Setting

Responders indicated if each of the activities was applicable to their work setting. The activities ranged from 27.3% applicability (27.3% of RNs reported that the activity was performed within their work setting) to 100% (100% of the RNs reported the activity was performed within their work setting).

Frequency of Activity Performance

Responders were asked to rate the frequency of performance of all activities that were applicable to their work setting on a six-point scale: "0 times" to "5 times or more." Average frequency statistics were calculated in two ways: setting-specific and total group. Average setting-specific frequencies ranged from 1.23 to 4.92. Average total group frequencies ranged from 0.36 to 4.92.

Importance of Activity Performance

Responders were asked to rate the importance of performing each nursing activity in regard to the maintenance of client safety and/or threat of complications or distress using a five-point scale: "1" (not important) to "5" (critically important). Average setting-specific importance ratings ranged from 3.33 to 4.88. Average total group importance ratings ranged from 2.94 to 4.88.

Clinical Judgment Relevancy of Activity Performance

Clinical judgment is defined as the observed outcome of critical thinking and decision making. It is an iterative process that uses nursing knowledge to observe and assess presenting situations, identify a prioritized client concern, and generate the best possible evidence-based solutions in order to deliver safe client care.

Responders were asked to rate the relevance of performing each nursing activity with regard to clinical judgment using a four-point scale: "1" (not relevant) to "4" (essential) and the option "DK" (do not know). Average setting-specific clinical judgment ratings ranged from 2.75 to 3.93. Average total group clinical judgment ratings ranged from 2.52 to 3.93.

Summary

Responders to the 2021 RN Practice Analysis found the activities listed in the survey to be highly applicable in their practice settings. In general, the importance ratings of SMEs and newly licensed RNs were somewhat similar (correlation = 0.74), supporting the validity of the results. The reliability of the survey instrument was quite good. Activities with the lowest average total group frequency and importance ratings corresponded, in general, to those activities performed in specialized areas of nursing practice. In addition, the correlation between total group importance and total group clinical judgment ratings is 0.92 indicating a strong relationship between the two ratings.

Conclusion

The 2021 RN Practice Analysis used several methods to describe the practice of newly licensed RNs in the U.S.: (1) document reviews; (2) daily logs of newly licensed RNs; (3) subject matter experts' knowledge; and (4) a large-scale survey. In addition, there was evidence to support the validity of the activity statement ratings. Based on evidence, the findings of this study can be used to evaluate and support an RN test plan.

BACKGROUND OF STUDY

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN®) is responsible to its members, the boards of nursing in the U.S. and its member board territories, for the preparation of psychometrically sound and legally defensible licensure examinations. The periodic performance of practice analysis (i.e., job analysis) studies assists NCSBN in evaluating the validity of the test plan that guides content distribution of the licensure examination. Furthermore, practice analysis studies have long been recognized by measurement and testing professions as important sources of validity evidence for licensure examinations (APA, AERA, and NCME, 2014; Raymond, 2001). Because the U.S. health care industry is rapidly changing, practice analysis studies are traditionally conducted by NCSBN on a three-year cycle. As nursing practice evolves, NCSBN continues to explore opportunities to keep the terminology in the practice analysis current. For this reason, a few data points that have been added or deleted since the 2017 NCLEX-RN Practice Analysis resulting in a lack of 1:1 comparison between the two reports. Due to COVID-19, the RN practice analysis was delayed from 2020 to 2021.

Methodology

A number of steps are necessary to perform an analysis of newly licensed RN practice. This section provides a description of the methodology used to conduct the 2021 RN Practice Analysis study. Descriptions of subject matter expert (SME) panel processes, survey development, sample selection and data collection procedures are provided, as well as information about assurance of confidentiality, response rate and the degree to which participants were representative of the population of newly licensed RNs.

Preliminary Interviews with Nurse Leaders

In order to collect information about trends in nursing and health care and to anticipate possible changes in the future of nursing practice, a variety of leaders in the nursing profession were contacted regarding their opinions. The information provided by nursing leaders was documented, and after leaders' identifying information was removed to provide anonymity, a summary of the interviews was made available as a source document for the SME panel to consider when developing the activity statements. In addition, two NCSBN staff reviewed the results of the interviews, noting any themes or trends. This information was then provided to the SME panel for consideration when developing activity statements.

Methodology Reviewers

Three methodology reviewers have been chosen for their expertise in practice/job analysis and certification exam development as reviewers of the methodologies and procedures for NCSBN's previous practice analysis studies. All three reviewers have indicated in the past that this methodology was psychometrically sound, legally defensible and in compliance with industry standards for practice analyses. After a sound methodology has been validated and approved by an external panel of SMEs in the area of psychometrics and practice analysis methodologies, that methodology will remain in effect until new procedures or methodologies are suggested. Should substantial changes to the methodology occur in future practice analyses, NCSBN Examinations staff shall ensure that a thorough review of the methodology is undertaken by external SMEs.

Panel of SMEs

A panel of 13 registered nurses was assembled to assist with the practice analysis. Panel members worked with and/or supervised the practice of RNs within their first twelve months of practice or were themselves newly licensed RNs and represented all geographic areas of the U.S., varied major nursing specialties and practice settings. See **Appendix A** for a listing of panel members.

The panel of experts performed several tasks crucial to the success of the practice analysis study. The SMEs were requested to ask at least four newly licensed RNs whom they worked with or supervised to submit activity logs describing the activities they performed on the job. Additionally, SMEs were asked to submit job descriptions, orientation, and professional evaluations from their work setting. Using activity logs, past activity statements, job descriptions, performance evaluation documents, as well as their own knowledge of newly licensed RN practices, the panel members worked to create a list of activities performed within each category of the current test plan category structure. Each activity was reviewed for applicability to newly licensed practice and the relationship to the delivery of safe nursing care to the public. Care was taken to create the activity statements at approximately the same level of specificity and to avoid redundancy.

Survey Development

Several processes were used to create, evaluate, and refine the survey instrument used for the 2021 RN Practice Analysis study. The activity statements created by the panel of experts were reviewed, edited, and approved by the NCLEX Examination Committee. The committee also approved the survey form. For this survey, only Web-based (Web) versions of the survey were utilized.

There were 146 nursing activity statements that were incorporated into a practice analysis survey. The survey also included questions about the nurses' practice settings, past experiences and demographics. Six forms of the survey were created to decrease the number of activity statements contained on each survey. Four survey forms contained 24 activity statements and two forms contained 25 activity statements. There were no shared activity statements between the survey forms. Except for the activity statements, these surveys were identical.

The survey contained six sections. In the first section, there were questions related to type of RN license, working in the U.S., and direct care of clients. Activity statements were also included in this section. The second section contained questions about months

of work experience as an RN, type and length of work orientation, and certifications earned. The third section focused on work environment including type and age of clients, employment setting, and type and size of facility. The fourth section requested information on the responders' last day of work including number of hours worked, number of clients for whom care was provided and the amount of time spent in various types of nursing activities. The fifth section pertained to basic demographic information. The sixth section provided space for responders to write comments or suggestions about the study. All forms of the Web versions of the survey used in the 2021 RN Practice Analysis may be found in **Appendix B**.

Survey Process

Sample Selection

A sample of 24,000 were randomly selected from the candidates who successfully passed the NCLEX-RN® from April 15, 2020 through Feb. 15, 2021, and were not previously included in the 2021 RN Nursing Knowledge Survey. A total of 310 surveys were removed from the initial sample because they were undeliverable.

Representativeness

The sample selected for this study was proportionally equivalent to the population from which the sample was drawn with respect to each NCSBN jurisdiction. **Table 1** presents the correspondence between the population, the sample size and the responders by NCSBN jurisdiction.

Emailing Procedure

Six forms of the Web survey were distributed evenly among 24,000 newly licensed RNs.

A five-stage emailing process was used to engage the participants in the study. A presurvey email was sent to each individual selected for the sample in April 2021.

One week later, recipients were sent an email invitation with a login address and a unique access code. Two weeks later, a reminder email was sent to all participants

reiterating the importance of the study and urging participation. Approximately two weeks after the first email, a second reminder was sent to nonresponders and two weeks later, a third email was sent to remaining nonresponders. The survey was conducted from April through June 2021.

Confidentiality

All potential participants were promised confidentiality regarding their participation and their responses. Files containing Personally Identifiable Information (PII) were kept separate from the data files. The study protocol was reviewed and approved by NCSBN's Chief Executive Officer for compliance with organizational guidelines for research studies involving human subjects.

Return Rates

Out of the 24,000 Web surveys sent, a total of 4,758 surveys were returned (801 for Form 1, 859 from Form 2, 769 from Form 3, 748 from Form 4, 778 from Form 5, and 803 from Form 6). A total of 310 Web surveys were identified as undeliverable due to incorrect email addresses. Therefore, the adjusted return rate was 20.1%. Of the 23,690 surveys sent, 4,758 responders completed the survey. A total of 544 individuals did not qualify for survey ratings based on one of the following reasons. RN Practice Analysis Survey Nonresponder Study

In order to ensure the validity of the results, NCSBN conducted an email and telephone survey of nonresponders to determine if those RNs not responding would have rated the survey activity statements differently than the responders. If there were no systematic differences in responders versus nonresponders, there would be further evidence signifying that the survey results are unbiased, which supports the validity of the 2021 RN Practice Analysis results. The nonresponders rated the activity statements similar to the responders, lending support for the validity of the results. See **Appendix I** for a full report of the nonresponder study.

Summary

A panel of 13 RNs, SMEs in the practice of newly licensed RNs, met and created a comprehensive list of RN activity statements. A survey was developed and revised before being sent to 24,000 newly licensed RNs selected from lists of candidates who passed the NCLEX-RN between April 15, 2020 through Feb. 15, 2021. The survey response rate was 17.8%. This practice analysis contains the responses of 4,214 newly licensed RNs.

DEMOGRAPHICS, EXPERIENCES AND PRACTICE ENVIRONMENTS OF PARTICIPANTS

Demographics/Past Experiences

Demographic information, including racial and ethnic backgrounds, educational preparation, and gender, are presented below, followed by descriptions of responders' work environments, including settings, shifts worked and client characteristics.



The majority of newly licensed RNs (87.5%) indicated their gender as female, a slight decrease from the percentage found in the 2017 survey. See **Figure 1** for gender. The age of responder nurses averaged 31.2 years (SD 8.9 years), similar to the average of 31.0 years from the 2017 survey.

Race/Ethnicity of Newly Licensed RNs

65.6% of participants in the current study reported their race/ethnicity as White-not of Hispanic origin. Participants also reported their race/ethnicity as follows: 14.1% Black or African American, 9.1% Hispanic or Latino, 7.7% Asian, and 0.4% Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander. See **Figure 2** for race/ethnicity reported by newly licensed RNs.

Of the responders, 86.2% reported English as their primary language and 9.1% reported both English and another language as their primary languages.





Educational Background

Newly licensed RNs indicated obtaining an associate degree most frequently (51.4%). The second most frequently chosen response was baccalaureate degree (41.6%). These percentages were similar to the educational diversity reported in 2017. See **Figure 3** for the educational background of the responders.

Previous Licensed Practical/Vocational Nurse (LPN/VN) or Unlicensed Assistive Personnel (UAP) Experience

Responders reported working an average of 6.2 months as an RN in the U.S. and reported being an average of 12.3 months post-graduation. On average, the data reflects newly licensed nurses were employed approximately 6 months after graduation during both





the 2017 and 2021 practice analysis periods. The data is presented in **Figure 4**.

Approximately 17.9% of RNs reported previous experience as a LPN/VN (a slight increase since 2017) and 45.2% reported previous experience as an unlicensed assistive personnel (UAP) (a slight decrease since 2017). The average experience in those positions was 6.3 years as a LPN/VN and 3.5 years as an UAP. The data is presented in **Table 2**.

Orientation

The majority of newly licensed RNs (96%) responded receiving some form of formal orientation. No formal orientation was reported by 4.0% and 1.2% reported having only classroom instruction or skills lab work for their orientation. Newly licensed RNs reported working with an assigned preceptor (59.9%) for an average of 9.5 weeks, and 6.8% (an approximate 3% decrease since 2017) reported having a classroom and/or skills lab plus supervised work with clients for an average of 7.7 weeks. An increased percentage from 2017, 25.7% of responders reported having a formal internship, which lasted an average of 12.4 weeks. The percentage of newly licensed nurses having formal internships has seen an increase over the last several practice analyses



studies. See **Table 3** for type of orientation with average time spent in each.

Certifications Earned

In the current study, 95.8% of responders reported earning additional certifications or completing coursework compared to 94.2% of responders in 2017. Basic Life Support (53.4%), Advanced Cardiac Life Support (29.0%) and Intravenous Therapy (12.2%) were the most frequently reported certifications. See **Table 4** for a complete listing of additional coursework and/or certifications completed. Survey responders could select more than one certification, resulting in a sum greater than 100%.

Work Settings

Facilities

The majority of newly licensed RNs (77.3%) reported working in hospitals. Only 8.8% reported working in long-term care facilities and 9.8% reported working in community-based or ambulatory care facilities/ organizations. Compared to 2017, there was a slight decrease in the percentage of newly licensed RNs working in hospitals and a slight increase in the percentage of newly licensed RNs working in long-term care facilities and community-based or ambulatory care facilities/organizations. The data is presented in **Table 5**.

Overall, the number of beds reported in hospitals or nursing homes was most commonly distributed among 100-299 beds (23.5%), 500 or more beds (20.2%), fewer than 100 beds (19.2%). Only 16.9% reported working in facilities with 300-499 beds. The majority of newly licensed RNs (52.5%) reported working in urban or metropolitan areas, 30.4% work in suburban areas, and 17.2% work in rural areas. Data for the size and location of the facilities where responders reported working is presented in **Table 6**.

Practice Settings


Newly licensed RNs reported most frequently working in the medical/surgical (23.3%) and critical care (17.3%) settings which is a slight decrease from 2017. Long-term care (e.g., nursing home, skilled or intermediate care) (6.0%) showed a slight increase from 2017, whereas rehabilitation (e.g., subacute or transitional care unit) (5.0%) and pediatrics (including nursery) (3.6%) are areas that have seen slight decreases from 2017. See **Table 7**.




Client Health Conditions

Newly licensed RNs reported caring for acutely ill clients (44.8%), clients with stabilized chronic conditions (37.8%), clients with unstabilized chronic conditions (35.5%), and clients with behavioral/emotional conditions (31.2%). These results are somewhat similar to the 2017 results; however, there was an increase in the percentage of nurses reporting caring for clients with behavioral/emotional conditions and caring for





Client Ages

The majority of newly licensed RNs reported that on their last day of work prior to completing the survey they were caring for older adult clients aged 65 to 85 (49.1%), adult clients aged 18 to 64 (48.3%), and older adult clients aged 85 or older (34.4%). Survey responders could select more than one client age range, resulting in



a sum greater than 100%. In the 2021 survey, the various pediatric age ranges were collapsed into one category (ages 0-17) where responders were only able to make one selection. In the 2017 survey, responders were able to report caring for pediatric patients in several age ranges. See **Figure 6** for client ages. Survey responders could select more than one client age, resulting in a sum greater than 100%.

On average, the responders were responsible for 9.4 clients on their last workday with a standard deviation of 17.0.

Shifts Worked

The shifts most commonly worked by newly licensed RNs were days (45.1%) and nights (37.9%). Only 10.9% of responders reported working rotating shifts. See **Figure 7** for shifts reported. Note that 1.1% selected "other" for shifts worked and these responders are not reflected in Figure 7.

On a typical workday, the majority of the responders (51.1%) worked a 12-hour shift, 22.0% worked a 13-hour shift, while 12.3% worked an 8-hour shift and 3.6% worked a 10-hour shift.

Time Spent in Different Categories of Nursing Activities

Responders to the current study were asked to record the number of hours spent performing specific categories of activities (see **Table 8**). The hours spent were then converted to proportions of time by dividing the hours spent on each activity by the number of hours spent working. Because nurses often perform multiple activities simultaneously, such as teaching while giving medications or providing emotional support while giving

routine care, the sum of proportions was greater than one. To make the proportions of time spent in activities useful to the task of helping to validate the NCLEX-RN® test plan, the proportions were standardized by dividing the time spent in each category of activity by the sum of hours spent in all the activities. These standardized proportions have the advantage of adding up to one. Newly licensed RNs reported spending the greatest amount of time in management of care (15%), safety and infection control (13%), physiological adaptation (13%), pharmacological and parenteral therapies (12%), reduction of risk potential (12%) and basic care and comfort (12%). The least amount of time was reportedly spent on psychosocial integrity (11%) and health promotion and maintenance (11%). Compared to the 2017 study, there were slight variations in time spent for almost all categories of activities.

Administrative Responsibilities/Primary Administrative Position

The newly licensed RNs responding to the practice analysis survey were asked if they had administrative responsibilities within their nursing position such as

being a unit manager, team leader, charge nurse, or coordinator. If RNs reported having such responsibilities, they were asked if they had a primary administrative position. Of all responders, 22.3% reported having such responsibilities and of those, 82.4% reported having a primary administrative position. RNs working in longterm care facilities were more likely to report having administrative responsibilities than RNs working in hospitals (62.0% in long-term care facilities compared to 14.1% in hospitals). In addition, RNs working in long-term care with administrative responsibilities were slightly more likely to report being in a primary administrative position than those working in hospitals (85.9% in longterm care facilities compared to 78.4% in hospitals). Of the RNs working in community-based settings, 37.3% reported having administrative responsibilities. Of those responders, 91.6% reported holding a primary administrative position. Compared to 2017, the results represent a slight percentage increase in administrative responsibilities overall (from 18.1% to 22.3%), a percentage increase in administrative responsibilities in hospitals (from 11.4% to 14.1%) and long-term care facilities (from 56.6% to 62.0%) and a decrease in community-based care facilities (from 42.6% to 37.3%). See **Table 9** for detailed results of administrative responsibilities.

Summary

The newly licensed RNs responding to the 2021 RN Practice Analysis survey were primarily female with an average age of 31.2 years. The majority worked day or night shifts in medical/surgical or critical care units of hospitals. The majority of responders were provided an orientation with an assigned preceptor or mentor for an average of 9.5 weeks. The responders cared mostly for clients with acute conditions who were either 18-64 years of age or 65-85 years of age.

ACTIVITY STATEMENT PERFORMANCE FINDINGS

Findings relative to the activities performed by newly licensed RNs are presented in this section of the report. The methods used to collect and analyze activity statement findings, applicability to practice setting, frequency of performance, importance of the activities and relevance to clinical judgment are discussed. A validation of survey findings with estimates provided by the SME panel is also provided.

Overview of Methods

The 2021 RN Practice Analysis survey asked responders to answer three questions about each activity statement. Question A addressed the frequency of activity performance. The scale of frequency ranged from "Never performed in work setting" to "5 or more times." Responders were instructed to select "Never performed in work setting" if an activity did not apply to their work setting and then to move to the next activity. If the activity did apply to their work setting, they were asked to select, on a six-point scale of "0 times" to "5 times or more," the frequency with which they had performed the activity on their last day of work. In question B, responders were asked to rate the overall importance of the activity considering client safety and/or threat of complications or distress on a scale of 1 to 5 with one being "Not Important" and five being "Critically Important." In question C, the relevance to clinical judgment when performing the nursing activity was addressed. The scale for clinical judgment ranged

from "Not Relevant (1)," "Helpful (2)," Important (3)" to "Essential (4)." If responders did not know if clinical judgment was relevant to performing the nursing activity they could select "DK=Do not know." Applicability of the activity statement to practice setting was assessed by analyzing the number of responders having performed each activity, excluding those that were marked "never performed."

Activity Performance Characteristics

Reliability

Reliability indices were calculated to assess the capability of the survey to measure the activities relevant to safe and effective practice of newly licensed RNs. Cronbach's alpha coefficients were calculated for frequency, importance and clinical judgment ratings of the survey to measure the internal consistency of the instrument (Cronbach, 1951). Alpha coefficients range from 0 to 1; a value of 0.70 or greater is generally considered adequate. **Table 10** shows that the data suggests strong evidence for the reliability of the measured outcomes in this survey.

SME Panel Validation of Survey Findings

The SME panel for the 2021 RN Practice Analysis was asked to provide independent ratings of the 146 activity statements. SMEs estimated the percentage of newly licensed RNs performing the activities within

their practice setting, the average setting-specific frequency with which the activities were performed during one day, the average importance of the activities and the average relevance of clinical judgment to the activities. After the ratings were obtained, average total group frequency estimates were calculated by prorating the setting-specific frequencies with the estimates of setting applicability. All panel ratings were averaged across panel members and compared to the ratings obtained from the practice analysis survey. The importance ratings estimated by panel members were compared to the average importance ratings from the practice analysis survey. Table 11 illustrates that there were no differences greater than 0.87 with respect to importance between the SME ratings and the newly licensed RNs. In general, the importance ratings of SMEs and survey responders were somewhat similar; however, responders regarded most of the activity statements as more important than the SMEs.

Applicability of Activities to Practice Setting

The percentages of newly licensed RNs indicating that the activities were applicable are included in **Table 12**. The activities ranged from 27.3% applicability (27.3%) of the responders reported that the activity was performed within their work setting) to 100% (100% of the responders reported the activity was performed within their work setting). The activities with the lowest percentage of applicability were "Provide care and education to an antepartum client or a client in labor" (27.3%), "Provide prenatal care and education" (28.5%), and "Implement and monitor phototherapy" (32.5%). The activities with the highest percentage of applicability for responders were "Apply principles of infection prevention (e.g., hand hygiene, aseptic technique, isolation, sterile technique, universal/standard enhanced barrier precautions)" (100%), "Maintain client confidentiality and privacy" (100%), "Use approved terminology when documenting care" (99.8%), "Protect client from injury" (99.8%), and "Properly identify client when providing care" (99.8%).

Frequency of Activity Performance

Responders were asked to rate the frequency of performance of all activities that were applicable to their work setting. Newly licensed RNs reported how frequently they performed the activity on the last day they worked using a six-point scale: "0 times" to "5 times or more." Average frequency statistics were calculated in two ways: setting-specific and total group. The settingspecific frequency was calculated by averaging the frequency ratings of those responders providing ratings (i.e., responders indicating that the activity applied to their work setting). The total group frequency was calculated by including the missing frequency ratings (i.e., responders indicating that the activity did not apply to their work setting) before averaging the rating. To perform this calculation, the missing frequency ratings were converted to zero ("0 times" on the rating scale) for inclusion in the total group frequency calculation. See **Table 12** for setting-specific and total group frequency.

Setting-Specific

Average setting-specific frequencies ranged from 1.23 to 4.92. The activities performed with the lowest frequencies were "Implement and monitor phototherapy" (1.23), "Perform and manage care of client receiving peritoneal dialysis" (1.29), and "Provide" care and education to an antepartum client or a client in labor" (1.31). The activities with the highest settingspecific average frequencies of performance were "Prepare and administer medications using rights of medication administration" (4.83), "Properly identify client when providing care" (4.84), and "Apply principles of infection prevention (e.g., hand hygiene, aseptic technique, isolation, sterile technique, universal/standard enhanced barrier precautions)" (4.92). Appendix C presents activity statements rank ordered by average setting-specific frequency.

Total Group

Average total group frequencies ranged from 0.36 to 4.92. The activities performed with the lowest total group frequency were "Provide care and education" to an antepartum client or a client in labor" (0.36), "Implement and monitor phototherapy" (0.40), and "Provide prenatal care and education" (0.55). The activities performed with the overall highest frequencies were "Apply principles of infection prevention (e.g., hand hygiene, aseptic technique, isolation, sterile technique, universal/standard enhanced barrier precautions)" (4.92), "Properly identify client when providing care" (4.83), and "Prepare and administer medications using rights of medication administration" (4.79). Appendix D presents activity statements rank ordered by average total group frequency.

Importance of Activity Performance

Responders were asked to rate the importance of performing each nursing activity with regard to the maintenance of client safety and/or threat of complications or distress. Responders were further requested to consider the importance of activity performance in terms of client safety, namely risk of unnecessary complications, impairment of function or serious distress to clients. Importance ratings were recorded using a five-point scale of "1" (Not Important) to "5" (Critically Important). Average importance ratings were calculated in two ways: setting-specific and total group. Setting-specific importance was calculated by averaging only the ratings of responders providing frequency ratings for the activity statement (RNs indicating that the activity applied to their work setting). The total group importance was calculated by including all importance ratings regardless of applicability to work setting. The average importance rating for each of the 146 activities is included in Table 13.

Setting-Specific

Average setting-specific importance ratings ranged from 3.33 to 4.88. The activities with the lowest importance ratings were "Recognize complementary therapies and identify potential benefits and contraindications (e.g., aromatherapy, acupressure, supplements)" (3.33), "Implement and monitor phototherapy" (3.45), and "Assess client sleep/rest pattern and intervene as needed" (3.51). The activities with the highest importance ratings were "Prepare and administer medications using rights of medication administration" (4.84), "Review pertinent data prior to medication administration (e.g., contraindications, lab results, allergies, potential interactions)" (4.85), and "Apply principles of infection prevention (e.g., hand hygiene, aseptic technique, isolation, sterile technique, universal/standard enhanced barrier precautions)" (4.88). **Appendix E** presents activity statements rank ordered by average setting-specific importance ratings.

Total Group

Average total group importance ratings ranged from 2.94 to 4.88. The activities with the lowest importance ratings were "Implement and monitor phototherapy" (2.94), "Recognize complementary therapies and identify potential benefits and contraindications (e.g., aromatherapy, acupressure, supplements)" (3.20), and "Provide post-partum care and education" (3.33). The activities with the highest importance ratings were "Apply principles of infection prevention (e.g., hand hygiene, aseptic technique, isolation, sterile technique, universal/standard enhanced barrier precautions)" (4.88), "Protect client from injury" (4.85), and "Review pertinent data prior to medication administration (e.g., contraindications, lab results, allergies, potential interactions)" (4.85). Appendix F presents activity statements rank ordered by average total group importance ratings.

Clinical Judgment Relevancy of Activity Performance

Clinical judgment is defined as the observed outcome of critical thinking and decision making. It is an iterative process that uses nursing knowledge to observe and assess presenting situations, identify a prioritized client concern, and generate the best possible evidence-based solutions in order to deliver safe client care.

Responders were asked to rate the relevance of performing each nursing activity with regard to clinical judgment. Clinical judgment relevancy ratings were recorded using a four-point scale of "1" (Not Relevant) to "4" (Essential) and the option "DK" (Do Not Know). Average clinical judgment relevance ratings were calculated in two ways: setting-specific and total group. Setting-specific clinical judgment relevance was

calculated by averaging only the ratings of responders that provided frequency ratings for the activity statements (RNs indicating that the activity applied to their work setting). The total group clinical judgment relevance was calculated by including all clinical judgment relevance ratings regardless of applicability to work setting. The average clinical judgment relevance rating for each of the 146 activities is included in **Table 14**.

Setting-Specific

Average setting-specific clinical judgment relevance ratings ranged from 2.75 to 3.93. The activities with the lowest clinical judgment relevance ratings were "Perform post-mortem care" (2.75), "Recognize complementary therapies and identify potential benefits and contraindications (e.g., aromatherapy, acupressure,

supplements)" (2.81) and "Manage conflict among clients and health care staff" (2.87). The activities with the highest clinical judgment relevance ratings were "Recognize signs and symptoms of client complications and intervene" (3.93), "Evaluate appropriateness and accuracy of medication order for client" (3.91), and "Review pertinent data prior to medication administration (e.g., contraindications, lab results, allergies, potential interactions)" (3.89). **Appendix G** presents activity statements rank ordered by average setting-specific clinical judgment ratings.

Total Group

Average total group clinical judgment relevance ratings ranged from 2.52 to 3.93. The activities with the lowest clinical judgment relevance ratings were "Implement and monitor phototherapy" (2.52), "Perform post-mortem care" (2.54) and "Recognize complementary therapies and identify potential benefits and contraindications (e.g., aromatherapy, acupressure, supplements)" (2.69). The activities with the highest clinical judgment relevance ratings were "Recognize signs and symptoms of client complications and intervene" (3.93), "Evaluate appropriateness and accuracy of medication order for client" (3.91), and "Review pertinent data prior to medication administration (e.g., contraindications, lab results, allergies, potential interactions)" (3.89). Appendix H presents activity statements rank ordered by average total group clinical judgment ratings.

Summary

Responders to the 2021 RN Practice Analysis found the activities listed in the survey to be highly applicable in their practice setting. In general, the importance ratings of SMEs and newly licensed RNs were somewhat similar (correlation = 0.74), supporting the validity of the results. The reliability of the survey instrument was quite good. Activities with the lowest average total group frequency and importance ratings corresponded, in general, to those activities performed in specialized areas of nursing practice. In addition, the correlation between total group importance and total group clinical judgment ratings is 0.92 indicating a strong relationship between the two ratings.

Conclusions

The 2021 RN Practice Analysis used several methods to describe the practice of newly licensed RNs in the U.S.: (1) document reviews; (2) activity logs of newly licensed RNs; (3) SMEs' knowledge; and (4) a large-scale survey. In addition, there was evidence to support the validity of the activity statement ratings. Based on evidence, the findings of this study can be used to evaluate and support an RN test plan.

APPENDIX I: 2021 RN PRACTICE ANALYSIS SURVEY NONRESPONDER STUDY

Introduction

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN®) conducts practice analysis studies every three years to assess the practice environment and emerging practice changes. Although the response rate for the 2021 RN Practice Analysis had an adequate analyzable response rate of approximately 17.8%, many individuals did not respond to the survey. Out of the 24,000 newly licensed RNs who were invited to take the survey, 4,758 returned the survey. NCSBN wanted to contact a sample of the invitees who chose not to participate in the survey to ascertain the reasons for not returning the survey and compare a sample of activity statements, as well as demographic information against the 2021 RN Practice Analysis survey responders.

Background of Study

NCSBN is responsible to its members, the boards of nursing in the U.S. and member board territories for the preparation of psychometrically sound and legally defensible licensure examinations. The periodic performance of practice analysis (i.e., job analysis) studies assists NCSBN in evaluating the validity of the test plan that guides content distribution of the licensure examination.

Findings from the 2021 RN Practice Analysis
Nonresponder Study provide possible reasons why
individuals do not participate in surveys and differences
between survey responders and nonresponders to
determine if the nonresponders were systematically
different in terms of demographics and ratings of
the activity statements. This study was conducted to
determine if the results for the practice analysis were
somehow biased.

Methodology

Sample Selection

A random sample of newly licensed RNs who were invited but did not respond to the 2021 RN Practice Analysis survey were contacted via email or telephone. The sample was derived from the 24,000 invitees who were emailed the Web form of the 2021 RN Practice Analysis survey. A total of 72 RNs from this sample completed the email or telephone survey.

Survey Instrument and Process

Nonresponders were contacted via email and telephone, using emails and telephone numbers provided by NCSBN. First, an email of the nonresponder survey was sent out to the nonresponders. If the nonresponders were instead reached using the telephone, they were given the option to complete the nonresponder survey by email or over the telephone. Regardless of email or telephone, the nonresponders were first asked about their reasons for not completing the survey. In order to facilitate the gathering of data from nonresponders, NCSBN developed a list of possible reasons why invitees may not have responded to the survey based on prior research. Possible reasons included the following: "too busy," "did not care," "do not like/trust surveys," "did not receive," or "other." Second, individuals were asked demographic information in order to provide background on nonresponders, including employment setting/specialty, and length of time. Finally, nonresponders were asked to rate the frequency of performance, importance and clinical judgment of 10 activities that were listed in the 2021 RN Practice Analysis survey. Nonresponders were thanked for their time and the data collected was recorded.

Nonresponder Results

Reasons for Not Responding

Reasons provided by the nonresponder RNs included "too busy" (33 responses or 45.8%), "did not receive" (22 responses or 30.6%) or "other" (8 responses or 11.1%). Five of the nonresponders (6.9%) indicated not caring as the reason for not returning the survey. Four of the nonresponders (5.6%) indicated not liking or not trusting surveys as the reason for not returning the survey.

Months Employed as an RN

Nonresponders were asked how many total months they worked as an RN. Nonresponders indicated that on average they worked 9.4 months as an RN, while responders averaged 6.2 months. The average number of months worked is greater because nonresponders were contacted about six weeks after the 2021 RN Practice Analysis was completed.

Employment Setting/Specialty

Nonresponders were asked to provide their setting/specialty. The different nursing specialties/employment settings were well represented in this sample and are included in **Table I.1**. The largest percentage (34.7% or 25 nonresponders) worked in critical care. Medical-surgical units were also frequently cited (25.0% or 18 nonresponders). These results are similar to the 2021 RN Practice Analysis survey, which identified that the largest percentage of responders worked in medical-surgical (23.3%) and critical care (17.3%). See **Table I.1**.

Importance Ratings

In general, the importance ratings between nonresponders and responders were very similar. No activity statement importance ratings differed by more than one point. See **Table I.2**.

Frequency Ratings

Frequency ratings provided by the nonresponders were compared to the average response rating of the 2021 RN Practice Analysis Survey responders.

The frequency ratings were very similar between nonresponders and responders. No activity statement frequency ratings between nonresponders and responders were more than one point. See **Table I.3**.

Clinical Judgment Ratings

Clinical judgment ratings between nonresponders and responders were also very similar. No activity statements for clinical judgment were more than one point between nonresponders and responders. See **Table I.4**.

Summary

The nonresponder study suggests that the main reasons individuals did not complete the 2021 RN Practice Analysis survey was because they were either too busy or did not receive the survey. In summary, the activity statement ratings were quite similar, which indicates that the results of the survey are not systematically biased. The nonresponder study provides support for the validity of the 2021 RN Practice Analysis results.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN®) is responsible to its members, the boards of nursing in the U.S. and its member board territories, for the preparation of psychometrically sound and legally defensible licensure examinations. The periodic performance of practice analysis (i.e., job analysis) studies assists NCSBN in evaluating the validity of the test plan that guides content distribution of the licensure examinations. Because the health care industry is rapidly changing, practice analysis studies are traditionally conducted by NCSBN on a three-year cycle.

The 2013-2014 NCSBN Strategic Practice Analysis highlighted the increasingly complex decisions newly licensed nurses make during the course of patient care. These increasingly complex decisions often require the use of clinical judgment to support patient safety. NCSBN has conducted several years of research and study to understand and isolate the individual factors that contribute to the process of nursing clinical judgment. When the concept of clinical judgment is explored relative to nursing, it is expected the individual contributing factors to clinical judgment will closely align with the performance of activities involved in the delivery of nursing care. In other words, those contributing factors align with nursing behavior and therefore remain an important underpinning in the nursing decision making process. As a result, NCSBN wanted to understand the relevance of clinical judgment in the performance of entry-level activities. The 2021 RN Practice Analysis includes survey questions to gather data to explore this subject. The following clinical judgment definition was provided to survey responders:

 Clinical judgment is defined as the observed outcome of critical thinking and decision making. It is an iterative process that uses nursing knowledge to observe and assess presenting situations, identify a prioritized client concern, and generate the best possible evidence-based solutions in order to deliver safe client care. A number of steps are necessary to perform an analysis of newly licensed registered nurse (RN) practice. A panel of subject matter experts was assembled, a list of RN activities was created and incorporated into a survey that was sent to a randomly drawn sample of newly licensed registered nurses, and data was collected and analyzed.

Methodology Reviewers

Three methodology reviewers have been chosen for their expertise in practice/job analysis and certification exam development as reviewers of the methodologies and procedures for NCSBN's previous practice analysis studies. All three reviewers have indicated in the past that this methodology was psychometrically sound, legally defensible and in compliance with industry standards for practice analyses. After a sound methodology has been validated and approved by an external panel of subject matter experts (SMEs) in the area of psychometrics and practice analysis methodologies, that methodology will remain in effect until new procedures or methodologies are suggested. Should substantial changes to the methodology occur in future practice analyses, NCSBN Examinations staff shall ensure that a thorough review of the methodology is undertaken by external SMEs.

Panel of Subject Matter Experts (SMEs)

A panel of 13 RNs was assembled to assist with the practice analysis. Two of the 13 panelists were RNs licensed/registered in Canada. Panel members worked with, educated and/or supervised the practice of RNs within their first twelve months of practice or were themselves newly licensed/registered RNs. Panel members represented geographic NCSBN areas of the U.S. and Canadian territories/jurisdictions using the NCLEX for licensure/registration decisions, all major nursing specialties, and varied practice settings.

The panel used the current test plan category structure describing the types of activities performed by newly licensed/registered RNs and developed a list of activities performed within each category of the structure.

Survey Development

A total of 146 nursing activity statements were incorporated into a practice analysis survey. The survey also included questions about the nurses' practice settings, past experiences and demographics. Some of the questions from the U.S. survey were slightly modified to accommodate for different terminology used in Canada. Six forms of the survey were created to reduce the number of activity statements on each survey and sent via Web to a sample of newly licensed/registered nurses (RNs in Canada). Except for slight differences in terminology, the survey forms were identical to the U.S. survey. Four of the survey forms contained 24 activity statements each and two survey forms contained 25 activity statements. Except for the activity statements unique to each survey form, the surveys were identical. The six survey forms were also translated to French.

Survey Process

Sample Selection

Two samples were randomly selected from the candidates who successfully passed the NCLEX-RN within 10 regulatory bodies in Canada from April 15, 2020 to Feb. 15, 2021. One sample was selected for the English survey and another sample for the French survey. First, a sample of 9,000 entry-level RNs who passed the English version of the exam in Canada during that time was randomly selected for the English survey. Due to the limited number of candidates who took and passed the French version of the exam during that time, it was necessary to use the entire population (55) for the French survey.

Both the English and French surveys were divided equally into six forms and sent via Web to newly licensed/registered RNs. A total of 9,000 newly licensed/registered RNs each received one of the six English forms and a total of 55 newly licensed/registered RNs each received one of the six French forms.

Emailing Procedure

A five-stage emailing process was used to engage the participants in the study. All potential participants were promised confidentiality with regard to their participation and their responses. The survey was conducted from April through June 2021.

Return Rates

Out of the 9,000 English surveys sent, a total of 2,438 surveys were returned (416 surveys for Form 1; 400 surveys for Form 2; 391 surveys for Form 3; 422 surveys for Form 4; 425 surveys for Form 5; and 384 surveys for Form 6). The raw response rate was approximately 27.2%. There were 491 individuals that did not qualify for survey ratings based on one of the following reasons. Either: (a) they did not indicate having an RN license/registration; (b) they were not currently working in Canada; (c) they were working less than 20 hours per week as an RN; and/or (d) they failed to answer the previous three demographic questions. After adjusting for removals, the analyzable response rate for the English survey was 21.8%.

Out of the 55 French surveys sent, a total of 19 surveys were returned (2 for Form 1; 5 for Form 2; 2 for Form 3; 2 for Form 4; 3 for Form 5; and 5 for Form 6). The raw response rate was 34.5%. There were two individuals that did not qualify for survey ratings due to previously mentioned reasons. After adjusting for removals, the analyzable response rate for the French survey was 30.9%.

RN Practice Analysis Survey Nonresponder Study

In order to ensure the validity of the results, NCSBN conducted an email and telephone survey of nonresponders to determine if those RNs not responding would have rated the survey activity statements differently. The nonresponders rated the activity statements similar to the responders, which provides support to the validity of the survey results.

Demographics, Experiences and Practice Environments of Participants

Demographics/Past Experiences

The majority of survey responders (89.0%) indicated their gender as female. The age of responder nurses averaged 28.1 years (SD 6.8 years). Responders indicated their racial/ethnic background as follows: 59.0% White, 10.3% South Asian, 10.0% Filipino, 4.7% Black and 4.4% Chinese.

Newly licensed/registered RNs listed obtaining a baccalaureate degree most frequently (88.6%) as the educational preparation for initial RN licensure/registration.

Responders indicated working an average of 7.1 months as an RN in Canada and reported being an average of 16.3 months post-graduation. Approximately 17.1% of newly licensed/registered RNs reported previous experience as a registered practical nurse (RPN) and 38.2% reported previous experience as unlicensed assistive personnel (UAP). The average experience in those positions was 4.5 years as a RPN and 1.5 years as an UAP.

Orientation

The majority of newly licensed/registered RNs (96.6%) received some form of formal orientation. No formal orientation was reported by 3.4% and 3.8% reported having only a formal internship with or without additional classroom or skills lab work for their orientation. The majority of newly licensed/registered RNs reported working with an assigned preceptor (67.9%) for an average of 4.4 weeks, and 18.9% reported having a classroom and/or skills lab plus supervised work with clients for an average of 3.7 weeks.

Certifications Earned

In the current study, 94.0% of responders reported earning additional certifications or completing coursework. Basic Life Support (47.7%), Intravenous Therapy (22.8%), and Advanced Cardiac Life Support (13.5%) were the most frequently reported certifications.

Facilities

The majority of newly licensed/registered RNs (79.6%) in this study reported working in hospitals. Only 10.4% reported working in long-term care and 7.5% reported working in community-based or ambulatory care facilities/organizations.

Overall, the number of beds reported in hospitals or nursing homes was most commonly distributed among 100-299 beds (20.5%), 500 or more beds (20.3%), and 300-499 beds (14.7%). Approximately 22.9% of responders indicated working in facilities containing less than 100 beds.

The majority of newly licensed/registered RNs (60.8%) reported working in urban or metropolitan areas, 20.1% in rural areas, and 19.1% in suburban areas.

Practice Settings

Newly licensed/registered RNs reported working in the medical/surgical (29.9%) and critical care (8.3%) settings. Some other commonly reported settings include long-term care (7.9%), palliative care (5.4%), and psychiatry or any of its subspecialties (e.g., detox inpatient, outpatient) (4.1%).

Client Health Conditions and Ages

A majority of the newly licensed/registered RNs reported that they cared for clients with acute conditions (41.6%). The next percentage of responders reported caring for clients with stabilized chronic conditions (38.2%), clients with behavioral/emotional conditions (34.8%) and clients with unstabilized chronic conditions (31.7%). There was an increase in the percentage of nurses that reported providing care for clients within most types of health conditions included in the survey.

In terms of age, the majority of newly licensed/registered RNs reported caring for older adult clients aged 65 to 85 (48.6%), adult clients aged 18 to 64 (42.3%), older adult clients over age 85 (36.5%) and pediatric clients aged 0 to 17 (10.1%).

Shifts Worked

The shifts most commonly worked by newly licensed/registered RNs were rotating shifts (74.0%) and days (15.2%).

Time Spent in Different Categories of Nursing Activities

Newly licensed/registered RNs reported spending the greatest amount of time in Management of Care (16%) and Physiological Adaptation (13%).

Administrative Responsibilities/Primary Administrative Position

Of the responders, 40.9% reported having administrative responsibilities and of those responders, 76.6% reported having a primary administrative position. RNs working in long-term care facilities were far more likely to report having administrative responsibilities than RNs working in hospitals (91.9% in long-term care compared to 33.2% in hospitals). In addition, RNs working in long-term care with administrative responsibilities were more likely to report being in a primary administrative position than those working in hospitals (83.2% in long-term care compared to 72.0% in hospitals). Of the RNs working in community-based settings, 46.1% reported having administrative responsibilities. Of those responders, 87.8% reported holding a primary administrative position.

Activity Performance Findings

Reliability

Reliability indices were calculated to assess the capability of the survey to measure the activities relevant to safe and effective practice of newly licensed/registered RNs. Cronbach's alpha coefficients were calculated for frequency, importance and clinical judgment ratings of the survey. The survey had an average reliability index of 0.91 for frequency, 0.91 for importance ratings and 0.89 for clinical judgment. These high reliability indices indicate the survey is reliably measuring the nursing activities necessary for competent RN practice.

SME Panel Validation of Survey Findings

The SME panel for the 2021 RN Practice Analysis was asked to provide independent ratings of the 146 activity statements. In general, the importance ratings of SMEs and survey responders were somewhat similar; however, SMEs regarded most of the activity statements as slightly more important than the responders.

Applicability of Activities to Practice Setting

Responders indicated if each of the activities was applicable to their work setting. The activities ranged from 24.4% applicability (24.4% of RNs reported that the activity was performed within their work setting) to 100% (100% of RNs reported the activity was performed within their work setting).

Frequency of Activity Performance

Responders were asked to rate the frequency of performance of all activities that were applicable to their work setting on a six-point scale: "0 times" to "5 times or more." Average frequency statistics were calculated in two ways: setting-specific and total group. Average setting-specific frequencies ranged from 1.13 to 4.90. Average total group frequencies ranged from 0.27 to 4.90.

Importance of Activity Performance

Responders were asked to rate the importance of performing each nursing activity with regard to the maintenance of client safety and/or threat of complications or distress using a five-point scale: "1" (not important) to "5" (critically important). Average setting-specific importance ratings ranged from 3.01 to 4.88.

Average total group importance ratings ranged from 2.86 to 4.88.

Clinical Judgment Relevancy of Activity Performance

Clinical judgment is defined as the observed outcome of critical thinking and decision making. It is an iterative process that uses nursing knowledge to observe and assess presenting situations, identify a prioritized client concern, and generate the best possible evidence-based

solutions in order to deliver safe client care. Responders were asked to rate the relevance of performing each nursing activity with regard to clinical judgment using a four-point scale: "1" (not relevant) to "4" (essential) and the option "DK" (do not know). Average setting-specific clinical judgment ratings ranged from 2.73 to 3.90. Average total group clinical judgment ranged from 2.57 to 3.90.

Summary

Responders to the 2021 Canadian RN Practice
Analysis found the activities listed in the survey to be representative of the work they performed in their practice settings. In general, the importance ratings of SMEs and newly licensed RNs were somewhat similar (correlation = 0.73), supporting the validity of the results. The reliability of the survey instrument was quite good. In addition, activities with the lowest average total group frequency and importance ratings corresponded, in general, to those activities performed in specialized areas of nursing practice.

Conclusion

The 2021 Canadian Practice Analysis used several methods to describe the practice of newly licensed/ registered RNs in the U.S. and Canadian territories/ jurisdictions: (1) document reviews; (2) daily logs of newly licensed/registered RNs; (3) SMEs' knowledge; and (4) a large-scale survey. There was evidence to support the validity of the activity statement ratings.

BACKGROUND OF STUDY

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN®) is responsible for the preparation of psychometrically sound and legally defensible licensure examinations. The periodic performance of practice analysis (i.e., job analysis) studies assists NCSBN in evaluating the validity of the test plan that guides content distribution of the licensure/ registration examination. Furthermore, practice analysis studies have long been recognized by measurement and testing professions as important sources of validity evidence for licensure examinations (APA, AERA, and NCME, 2014; Raymond, 2001). Because the health care industry is rapidly changing, practice analysis studies are traditionally conducted by NCSBN on a three-year cycle. As nursing practice evolves, NCSBN continues to explore opportunities to keep the terminology in the practice analysis current. For this reason, a few data points that have been added or deleted since the 2017 Canadian NCLEX-RN Practice Analysis resulting in a lack of 1:1 comparison between the two reports. Due to COVID-19, the RN practice analysis was delayed from 2020 to 2021.

Panel of SMEs

A panel of 13 RNs was assembled to assist with the practice analysis. Two of the 13 panelists were RNs licensed/registered in Canada. See the section on panel of subject matter experts in **Part I** for more details.

Survey Development

A total of 146 nursing activity statements were incorporated into the practice analysis survey. The survey also included questions about the nurses' practice settings, past experiences and demographics. Some of the questions from the U.S. survey were slightly modified to accommodate for different terminology used in Canada. Six forms of the survey were created to reduce the number of activity statements on each survey and sent via Web to a sample of newly licensed/registered RNs. Except for slight differences in terminology, the surveys were identical to the U.S. survey. Four of the survey forms contained 24 activity statements and two survey forms contained 25 activity statements. There were no shared activity statements between the survey forms. Except for the activity statements unique to each survey form, the surveys were identical. The six forms were also translated to French. See the section on survey development in Part I for more details.

Survey Process

Sample Selection and Representativeness

Two samples were randomly selected from the candidates who successfully passed the NCLEX-RN within 10 regulatory bodies in Canada from April 15, 2020 to Feb. 15, 2021. One sample was selected for the English survey and another sample for the French survey. First, a sample of 9,000 newly licensed/registered RNs who passed the English version of the exam in Canada during that time was randomly selected for the English survey. Due to the very limited number of candidates who took and passed the French version of the exam during that time, it was necessary to use the entire population (55) for the French survey.

Both the English and French surveys were divided equally into six forms and sent via Web to newly licensed/ registered RNs. A total of 9,000 newly licensed/ registered RNs each received one of the six English forms and a total of 55 newly licensed/registered RNs each

received one of the six French forms. **Table 1** presents the correspondence of sample and responders by regulatory body for the English survey.

Emailing Procedure

The survey was sent to 9,055 newly licensed/registered RNs in 10 regulatory bodies in Canada via Web (9,000 received the English survey and 55 received the French survey). A five-stage emailing process was used to engage participants in the study. A presurvey email was sent to each individual in the sample. One week later, recipients were sent an email invitation with a login address and a unique access code. Two weeks later, an email was sent to all participants reiterating the importance of the study and urging participation. Approximately two weeks after the first email, a second reminder was sent to nonresponders and two weeks later, a third email was sent to remaining nonresponders. The survey was conducted from April through June 2021.

Confidentiality

See the section on confidentiality in **Part I** for more details.

Return Rates

Out of the 9,000 English surveys sent, a total of 2,438 surveys were returned (416 for Form 1; 400 for Form 2; 391 for Form 3; 422 for Form 4; 425 for Form 5; and 384 for Form 6). The raw response rate was 27.2%. There were 491 individuals that did not qualify for survey ratings based on one of the following reasons. Either: (a) they did not indicate having an RN license/registration; (b) they were not currently working in Canada; (c) they were working less than 20 hours per week as an RN; and/or (d) they failed to answer the previous three demographic questions. After adjusting for removals, the analyzable response rate for the English survey was 21.8%.

Out of the 55 French surveys, 19 surveys were returned (2 for Form 1; 5 for Form 2; 2 for Form 3; 2 for Form 4; 3 for Form 5; and 5 for Form 6). The raw response rate was 34.5%. There were two individuals that did not qualify for survey ratings due to previously mentioned reasons. After adjusting for removals, the analyzable response rate for the French survey was 30.9%.

RN Practice Analysis Survey Nonresponder Study

In order to ensure the validity of the results, NCSBN conducted an email and telephone survey of

nonresponders to determine if those RNs not responding would have rated the survey activity statements differently. If there were no systematic differences in responders versus nonresponders, there would be further evidence signifying that the survey results are unbiased, which supports the validity of the 2021 RN Practice Analysis results. The nonresponders rated the activity statements similar to the responders, lending support for the validity of the results. See **Appendix B** for a full report of the nonresponder study.

Summary

A panel of 13 RNs, subject matter experts in the practice of newly licensed/registered RNs, met and created a comprehensive list of RN activity statements. A survey was developed and revised before being sent to 9,055 RNs who passed the NCLEX-RN for Canadian licensure/registration between April 15, 2020 and Feb. 15, 2021. The analyzable survey response rate was 21.8% for the English survey and 30.9% for the French survey. This practice analysis contains the responses of 1,964 newly licensed/registered RNs in Canada (including both the English and French versions of the survey).

DEMOGRAPHICS, EXPERIENCES AND PRACTICE ENVIRONMENTS OF PARTICIPANTS

Demographics/Past Experiences

Demographic information, including racial and ethnic backgrounds, educational preparation, and gender, are presented below, followed by descriptions of responders' work environments, including settings, shifts worked and client characteristics.


Age and Gender

The majority of survey responders (89.0%) reported their gender as female, which was a slight decrease from the percentage identified in the 2017 Canadian RN Practice Analysis. See **Figure 1** for gender. The age of responder nurses averaged 28.1 years (SD 6.8 years), which is higher than the average of 27.3 years (SD 6.4 years) from the 2017 Canadian RN Practice Analysis.

Race/Ethnicity of Newly Licensed/Registered RNs

Survey responders reported their race/ethnicity as follows: 59.0% White, 10.3% South Asian, 10.0% Filipino, 4.7% Black and 4.4% Chinese. There was a decrease in the percentage of responders who reported their race/ethnicity as White compared to 2017. See **Figure 2** for race/ethnicity.

Of the responders, 73.7% indicated English as their primary language and 15.6% indicated both English and another language as their primary languages. The




remaining 10.7% indicated another language (8.9%), French (1.2%) and both French and another language (0.6%).


Educational Background

Newly licensed/registered RNs listed obtaining a baccalaureate degree most frequently (88.6%) as the educational preparation for initial RN licensure/registration.

Previous Licensed Practical/Vocational Nurse (LPN/VN) or Unlicensed Assistive Personnel (UAP) Experience

Responders reported working an average of 7.1 months as an RN in Canada and reported being an average of 16.3 months post-graduation. See **Figure 3**.





Approximately 17.1% reported previous experience as a registered practical nurse (RPN) and 38.2% reported previous experience as a unlicensed assistive personnel (UAP). The average experience in those positions was 4.5 years as a RPN and 1.5 years as an UAP. The data is presented in **Table 2**.

Orientation

The majority of newly licensed/registered RNs (96.6%) received some form of formal orientation. No formal orientation was reported by 3.4% and 3.8% reported having only a formal internship with or without additional classroom or skills lab work for their orientation. Newly licensed/registered RNs reported working with an assigned preceptor (67.9%) for an average of 4.4 weeks, and 18.9% reported having a classroom and/or skills lab plus supervised work with clients for an average of 3.7 weeks. See **Table 3** for orientation type and length.

Certifications Earned

In the current study, 94.0% of responders reported earning additional certification or completing additional coursework. Basic Life Support (47.7%), Intravenous Therapy (22.8%), and Advanced Cardiac Life Support (13.5%) were the most frequently reported certifications. See **Table 4** for a complete listing of additional coursework and/or certification completed. Survey

responders could select more than one certification, resulting in a sum greater than 100%.

Work Settings

Facilities

The majority of newly licensed/registered RNs (79.6%) reported working in hospitals. Only 10.4% reported working in long-term care and 7.5% reported working in community-based or ambulatory care facilities/ organizations. The data is presented in **Table 5**.

Related to the size of the facilities in which responders work, the bulk of newly licensed/registered RNs indicated working in hospitals with at least 100 beds. Overall, the number of beds reported in hospitals or nursing homes was most commonly distributed among 100-299 beds (20.5%), 500 or more beds (20.3%), 300-499 beds (14.7%). Approximately 22.9% of responders indicated working in facilities containing less than 100 beds (13.5% reported less than 50 beds and 9.4% reported 50-99 beds).

The majority of newly licensed/registered RNs (60.8%) reported working in urban or metropolitan areas, 20.1% in rural areas, and 19.1% in suburban areas. Data for the size and location of the facilities where responders reported working is presented in **Table 6**.

Practice Settings

Newly licensed/registered RNs reported working in the medical/surgical (29.9%) and critical care (8.3%) settings most frequently, which decreased in percentage compared to 2017. Some other commonly reported settings include long-term care (e.g., nursing home, skilled or immediate care (7.9%), palliative care (5.4%), psychiatry or any of its subspecialties (e.g., detox inpatient, outpatient) (4.1%), pediatrics (3.6%), and labor and delivery (2.9%). The data is presented in **Table 7**.

Client Health Conditions

Newly licensed/registered RNs reported caring for acutely ill clients (41.6%), clients with stable chronic conditions (38.2%), clients with behavioral/emotional

conditions (34.8%) and clients with unstabilized chronic conditions (31.7%). There were some slight increases and decreases in the percentage of nurses that reported providing care for clients within each type of health condition included in the survey when compared to 2017. See **Figure 4** for data on client health conditions. Survey responders could select more than one option, resulting in a sum greater than 100%.

Client Ages

The majority of newly licensed/registered RNs reported caring for older adult clients aged 65 to 85 (48.6%), adult clients aged 18 to 64 (42.3%), older adult clients over age 85 (36.5%) and pediatric clients aged 0 to 17 (10.1%). See **Figure 5** for data on client ages. Survey responders could select more than one age range, resulting in a sum greater than 100%.

On average, the responders were responsible for 12.6 clients on their last workday with a standard deviation of 21.2.

Shifts Worked

The shifts most commonly worked by newly licensed/ registered RNs were rotating shifts (74.0%) and days (15.2%). Only 5.4% reported working nights and only 3.4% reported evenings. See **Figure 6** for shifts reported. Note that a very small number of responders selected "other" for shifts worked and these responses are not reflected in Figure 6.


On a typical workday, the majority of the responders (66.5%) worked a 12-hour shift, 22.7% worked an 8-hour shift while 3.7% worked a 13-hour shift.






Time Spent in Different Categories of Nursing Activities


Responders to the current study were asked to record the number of hours spent performing specific categories of activities (see **Table 8**). The hours spent were then converted to proportions of time by dividing the hours spent on each activity by the number of











spending the greatest amount of time in management of care (16%), physiological adaptation (13%), basic care and comfort (12%), psychosocial integrity (12%), safety and infection control (12%) and pharmacological and parenteral therapies (12%). The relatively least amount of time was reportedly spent on health promotion and maintenance (11%) and reduction of risk potential (11%). Compared to the 2017 survey, there were only very slight variations in time spent for almost all categories of activities.

Administrative Responsibilities/Primary Administrative Position

The newly licensed/registered RNs responding to the practice analysis survey were asked if they had administrative responsibilities within their nursing position such as being a unit manager, a team leader, charge nurse, or a coordinator. If RNs reported having such responsibilities, they were asked if they had a primary administrative position. Of the responders, 40.9% reported having administrative responsibilities and of those, 76.6% reported having a primary administrative position. RNs working in long-term care facilities were far more likely to report having administrative responsibilities than RNs working in hospitals (91.9% in long-term care compared to 33.2% in hospitals). In addition, RNs working in long-term care with administrative responsibilities were more likely to report being in a primary administrative position than those working in hospitals (83.2% in long-term care compared to 72.0% in hospitals). Of

the RNs working in community-based settings, 46.1% reported having administrative responsibilities. Of those responders, 87.8% reported holding a primary administrative position. The data is presented in **Table 9**.

Summary

The newly licensed/registered RNs responding to the 2021 Canadian RN Practice Analysis survey were primarily female with an average age of 28.1 years. The majority worked rotating or day shifts in medical/surgical or critical care units of hospitals. The majority of responders were provided an orientation with an assigned preceptor or mentor for an average of 4.4 weeks. The responders cared mostly for adult clients with acute or chronic conditions who were 65-85 years of age or 18-64 years of age.

ACTIVITY STATEMENT PERFORMANCE FINDINGS

Findings relative to the activities performed by newly licensed/registered RNs in Canada are presented in this section of the report. The methods used to collect and analyze activity statement findings, applicability to practice settings, frequency of performance, importance of the activities and relevance to clinical judgment are discussed. A validation of survey findings with estimates provided by the subject matter expert panel is also provided.

Overview of Methods

See the section on overview of methods in **Part I** for more details.

Activity Performance Characteristics

Reliability

Reliability indices were calculated to assess the capability of the survey to measure the activities relevant to safe and effective practice of newly licensed/registered RNs. Cronbach's alpha coefficients were calculated for frequency, importance and clinical judgment ratings for the survey. The survey had an average reliability index of 0.91 for frequency, 0.91 for importance, and 0.89 for relevance to clinical judgment ratings. These high reliability indices indicate the survey is reliably measuring the nursing activities necessary for competent RN practice. See **Table 10**.

SME Panel Validation of Survey Findings

The subject matter expert (SME) panel for the 2021 RN Practice Analysis was asked to provide independent ratings of the 146 activity statements. SMEs estimated the percentage of newly licensed/registered RNs performing the activities within their practice settings, the average setting-specific frequency with which the activities were performed during one day, the average importance of the activities and the average relevance of clinical judgment to the activities. After the ratings were obtained, average total group frequency estimates were calculated by prorating the setting-specific frequencies with the estimates of setting applicability. All panel ratings were averaged across panel members and compared to the ratings obtained from the practice analysis survey. The importance ratings estimated by panel members were compared to the average importance ratings from the practice analysis survey. There were no differences greater than 0.84 with respect to importance between the SME ratings and the newly licensed/registered RNs in Canada. In general, the SMEs rated most of the activity statements as more important than responders.

Applicability of Activities to Practice Setting

The percentages of newly licensed/registered RNs indicating that the activities were applicable are included in **Table 11**. The activities ranged from 24.4% applicability (24.4% of the responders reported that the activity was performed within their work settings) to 100% (100% of the responders reported the activity was performed

within their work setting). The activities with the lowest percentage of applicability were "Implement and monitor phototherapy" (24.4%), "Provide care and education to an antepartum client or a client in labor" (25%), and "Provide prenatal care and education" (33%). There were 11 activities with the highest percentage of applicability (100%). Some of those activities were "Maintain client confidentiality and privacy," "Protect client from injury," and "Practice in a manner consistent with the nurses' code of ethics," and "Protect client from injury."

Frequency of Activity Performance

Responders were asked to rate the frequency of performance of all activities that were applicable to their work settings. Newly licensed/registered RNs reported how frequently they performed the activity on the last day they worked using a six-point scale: "0 times" to "5 times or more." Average frequency statistics were calculated in two ways: setting-specific and total group. The setting-specific frequency was calculated by averaging the frequency ratings of those responders providing ratings (i.e., responders indicating that the activity applied to their work setting). The total group frequency was calculated by including the missing frequency ratings (i.e., responders indicating that the activity did not apply to their work setting) before averaging the rating. To perform this calculation, the missing frequency ratings were converted to zero ("0 times" on the rating scale) for inclusion in the total group frequency calculation. See Table 11 for setting-specific and total group frequency.

Setting-Specific

Average setting-specific frequencies ranged from 1.13 to 4.90. The activities performed with the lowest frequencies were "Implement and monitor phototherapy" (1.13), "Monitor and care for clients on a ventilator" (1.14), and "Acknowledge and document practice errors and near misses" (1.19). The activities with the highest setting-specific average frequencies of performance were "Apply principles of infection prevention (e.g., hand hygiene, aseptic technique, isolation, sterile technique,

universal/standard enhanced barrier precautions)" (4.90), "Prepare and administer medications using rights of medication administration" (4.88), and "Practice in a manner consistent with the nurses' code of ethics" (4.80).

Total Group

Average total group frequencies ranged from 0.27 to 4.90. The activities performed with the lowest total group frequency were "Implement and monitor phototherapy" (0.27), "Monitor and care for clients on a ventilator" (0.45), and "Provide prenatal care and education" (0.56). The activities performed with the overall highest frequencies were "Apply principles of infection prevention (e.g., hand hygiene, aseptic technique, isolation, sterile technique, universal/standard enhanced barrier precautions)" (4.90), "Prepare and administer medications using rights of medication administration" (4.88), and "Practice in a manner consistent with the nurses' code of ethics" (4.80).

Importance of Activity Performance

Responders were asked to rate the importance of performing each nursing activity in regard to the maintenance of client safety and/or threat of complications or distress. Responders were further requested to consider the importance of activity performance in terms of client safety, namely risk of unnecessary complications, impairment of function or serious distress to clients. Importance ratings were recorded using a five-point scale of "1" (Not Important) to "5" (Critically Important). Average importance ratings were calculated in two ways: setting-specific and total group. Setting-specific importance was calculated by averaging only the ratings of responders providing frequency ratings for the activity statement (RNs indicating that the activity applied to their work setting). The total group importance was calculated by including all importance ratings regardless of applicability to work setting. The average importance rating for each of the 146 activities is included in **Table 12**.

Setting-Specific

Average setting-specific importance ratings ranged from 3.01 to 4.88. The activities with the lowest importance ratings were "Recognize complementary therapies and identify potential benefits and contraindications (e.g., aromatherapy, acupressure, supplements)" (3.01), "Practice and advocate for cost effective care" (3.12), and "Assess client sleep/rest pattern and intervene as needed" (3.41). The activities with the highest importance ratings were "Prepare and administer medications using rights of medication administration" (4.88), "Provide care within the legal scope of practice" (4.80), "Apply principles of infection prevention (e.g., hand hygiene, aseptic technique, isolation, sterile technique, universal/ standard enhanced barrier precautions)" (4.78), and "Protect client from injury" (4.78).

Total Group

Average total group importance ratings ranged from 2.86 to 4.88. The activities with the lowest importance ratings were "Recognize complementary therapies and identify potential benefits and contraindications (e.g., aromatherapy, acupressure, supplements)" (2.86), "Implement and monitor phototherapy" (3.01) and "Practice and advocate for cost effective care" (3.08). The activities with the highest importance ratings were "Prepare and administer medications using rights of medication administration" (4.88), "Provide care within the legal scope of practice" (4.78), "Protect client from injury" (4.78), "Apply principles of infection prevention (e.g., hand hygiene, aseptic technique, isolation, sterile technique, universal/standard enhanced barrier precautions)" (4.78), "Properly identify client when providing care" (4.77) and "Review pertinent data prior to medication administration (e.g., contraindications, lab results, allergies, potential interactions)" (4.77).

CLINICAL JUDGMENT RELEVANCY OF ACTIVITY PERFORMANCE

Clinical judgment is defined as the observed outcome of critical thinking and decision making. It is an iterative process that uses nursing knowledge to observe and assess presenting situations, identify a prioritized client concern, and generate the best possible evidence-based solutions in order to deliver safe client care.

Responders were asked to rate the relevance of performing each nursing activity with regard to clinical judgment. Clinical judgment relevancy ratings were recording using a four-point scale of "1" (Not Relevant) to "4" (Essential) and the option "DK" (Do Not Know). Average clinical judgment relevance ratings were calculated in two ways: setting-specific and total group. Setting-specific clinical judgment relevance was calculated by averaging only the ratings of responders that provided frequency ratings for the activity statements (RNs indicating that the activity applied to their work setting). The total group clinical judgment relevance was calculated by including all clinical judgment relevance ratings regardless of applicability to work setting. The average clinical judgment relevance rating for each of the 146 activities is included in Table 13.

Setting-Specific

Average setting-specific clinical judgment relevance ratings ranged from 2.73 to 3.90. The activities with the lowest clinical judgment relevance ratings were "Practice and advocate for cost effective care" (2.73), "Recognize complementary therapies and identify potential benefits and contraindications (e.g., aromatherapy, acupressure, supplements)" (2.73), "Perform post-mortem care" (2.76) and "Plan and/or participate in community health education" (2.77). The activities with the highest clinical judgment relevance ratings were "Review pertinent data prior to medication administration (e.g., contraindications, lab results, allergies, potential interactions)" (3.90), "Assess and respond to changes and trends in client vital signs " (3.90), "Recognize signs and symptoms of client complications and intervene" (3.87), "Prioritize the

delivery of client care based on acuity" (3.86), "Recognize trends and changes in client condition and intervene as needed" (3.86) and "Manage the care of a client with impaired ventilation/oxygenation" (3.86).

Total Group

Average total group clinical judgment relevance ratings were from 2.57 to 3.90. The activities with the lowest clinical judgment relevance ratings were "Implement and monitor phototherapy" (2.57), "Recognize complementary therapies and identify potential benefits and contraindications (e.g., aromatherapy, acupressure, supplements)" (2.62), and "Practice and advocate for cost effective care" (2.65). The activities with the highest clinical judgment relevance ratings were "Review pertinent data prior to medication administration (e.g., contraindications, lab results, allergies, potential interactions)" (3.90), "Assess and respond to changes and trends in client vital signs" (3.89) and "Recognize signs and symptoms of client complications and intervene" (3.86).

Summary

Responders to the 2021 Canadian RN Practice
Analysis found the activities listed in the survey to be
representative of the work they performed in their
practice settings. In general, the importance ratings of
SMEs and responders were similar (correlation = 0.73),
supporting the validity of the results. The reliability
of the survey instrument was quite good. In addition,
activities with the lowest average total group frequency
and importance ratings corresponded, in general, to
those activities performed in specialized areas of nursing
practice.

Conclusions

The 2021 Canadian RN Practice Analysis used several methods to describe the practice of newly licensed/ registered RNs in the U.S. and Canadian territories/ jurisdictions: (1) document reviews; (2) daily logs of newly licensed/registered RNs; (3) subject matter experts' knowledge; and (4) a large-scale survey. There was evidence to support the validity of the activity statement ratings.

APPENDIX B: 2021 RN PRACTICE ANALYSIS SURVEY NONRESPONDER STUDY

Introduction

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN®) conducts practice analysis studies every three years to assess the practice environment and emerging practice changes. Although the response rate for the 2021 RN Canadian Practice Analysis had an adequate analyzable response rate of approximately 21.8%, many individuals did not respond to the survey. Out of the 9,055 newly licensed/registered RNs who were invited to take the survey (9,000 received the English version, 55 received the French version), 2,457 returned the survey. NCSBN wanted to contact a sample of the invitees who chose not to participate in the survey to ascertain the reasons for not returning the survey and compare a sample of activity statements, as well as demographic information against the 2021 Canadian RN Practice Analysis survey responders.

Background of Study

NCSBN is responsible for the preparation of psychometrically sound and legally defensible licensure/registration examinations. The periodic performance of practice analysis (i.e., job analysis) studies assists NCSBN in evaluating the validity of the test plan that guides content distribution of the licensure/registration examination.

Findings from the 2021 Canadian RN Practice Analysis Nonresponder Study provide possible reasons why individuals do not participate in surveys and differences between survey responders and nonresponders to determine if the nonresponders were systematically different in terms of demographics and ratings of the activity statements. This study was conducted to determine if the results for the practice analysis were somehow biased.

Methodology

Sample Selection

A random sample of newly selected RNs who were invited but did not respond to the 2021 Canadian RN Practice Analysis survey was contacted via email and telephone. The sample was derived from the 9,000 newly licensed RNs who were invited to take the English version of the survey. There were 67 RNs from this sample that completed the email or telephone interview.

Survey Instrument and Process

Nonresponders were contacted via email and telephone, using emails and telephone numbers provided by NCSBN. First, an email of the nonresponder survey was sent out to the nonresponders. If the nonresponders were instead reached using the telephone, they were given the option to complete the nonresponder survey by email or over the telephone. Regardless of email or telephone, the nonresponders were first asked about their reasons for not completing the survey. In order to facilitate the gathering of data from nonresponders, NCSBN developed a list of possible reasons why invitees may not have responded to the survey based on prior research. Possible reasons included the following: "too busy," "did not care," "do not like/trust surveys," "did not receive," or "other." Second, individuals were asked demographic information in order to provide background on nonresponders, including employment setting/ specialty, and length of time. Finally, nonresponders were asked to rate the frequency, importance and clinical judgment of 10 activities that were listed in the 2021 RN Practice Analysis survey. Nonresponders were thanked for their time and the data collected was recorded.

Nonresponder Results

Reasons for Not Responding

Reasons provided by the nonresponder RNs included "too busy" (31 responses or 46.3%), "did not receive" (25 responses or 37.3%), "did not care" (6 responses or 9.0%), "other" (4 responses or 6.0%) or "do not like/trust surveys" (1 responses or 1.5%).

Months Employed as an RN

Nonresponders were asked how many total months they worked as an RN. Nonresponders indicated that on average they worked 10.1 months as an RN, while responders averaged 7.1 months. The average number of months worked is greater because nonresponders were contacted about six weeks after the 2021 RN Practice Analysis was completed.

Employment Setting/Specialty

Nonresponders were asked to provide their setting/ specialty. The different nursing specialties/employment settings were well represented in this sample and are included in **Table B.1**. The largest percentage (31.3% or 21 nonresponders) worked in medical-surgical units. Critical care units were also frequently cited (20.9% or 14 nonresponders). These results are similar to the 2021 Canadian RN Practice Analysis survey, which identified the largest percentage of responders worked in medicalsurgical (29.9%) and critical care (8.3%). See **Table B.1**.

Importance Ratings

In general, the importance ratings between nonresponders and responders were very similar, with no activity statement importance rating differing by more than one point. See **Table B.2**.

Frequency Ratings

In general, the frequency ratings between nonresponders and responders were very similar, with no activity statement frequency rating differing by more than one point. See **Table B.3**.

Clinical Judgment Ratings

In general, the clinical judgment ratings between nonresponders and responders were very similar, with no activity statement clinical judgment rating differing by more than one point. See **Table B.4**.

Summary

The nonresponder study suggests that the main reasons individuals did not complete the survey were because they were either too busy or did not receive the survey. In summary, most of the activity statement ratings were quite similar, which indicates that the results of the survey are not systematically biased. The nonresponder study provides support for the validity of the 2021 Canadian RN Practice Analysis results.
