

2024 PN Practice Analysis: Linking the NCLEX-PN® Examination to Practice

National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Inc. (NCSBN°)

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN®) is responsible to its members, the nursing regulatory bodies in the U.S. and its member board territories, for the preparation of psychometrically sound and legally defensible licensure examinations. The periodic performance of practice analysis (i.e., job analysis) studies assists NCSBN in evaluating the validity of the test plan that guides content distribution of the licensure examinations. Because the U.S. health care industry is rapidly changing, practice analysis studies are traditionally conducted by NCSBN on a three-year cycle.

The 2013-2014 NCSBN Strategic Practice Analysis highlighted the increasingly complex decisions newly licensed nurses make during the course of patient care. These increasingly complex decisions often require the use of clinical judgment to support patient safety. NCSBN has conducted several years of research and study to understand and isolate the individual factors that contribute to the process of nursing clinical judgment. When the concept of clinical judgment is explored relative to nursing, it is expected the individual contributing factors to clinical judgment will closely align with the performance of activities involved in the delivery of nursing care. In other words, those contributing factors align with nursing behavior and therefore remain an important underpinning in the nursing decision-making process. As a result, NCSBN wanted to understand the relevance of clinical judgment in the performance of entry-level activities. The 2024 PN Practice Analysis includes survey questions to gather data to explore this subject. The following clinical judgment definition was provided to survey respondents:

Clinical judgment is defined as the observed outcome of critical thinking and decision making. It is an iterative process that uses nursing knowledge to observe and assess presenting situations, identify a prioritized client concern, and generate the best possible evidence-based solutions in order to deliver safe client care.

A number of steps are necessary to perform a practice analysis of licensed practical nurses/vocational nurses (LPN/VNs) who are newly licensed. A panel of subject matter experts (SMEs) was assembled, a list of LPN/VN activities was created and incorporated into a survey that was sent to a randomly drawn sample of newly licensed LPN/VNs, and data were collected and analyzed.

Methodology Reviewers

Three methodology reviewers were chosen for their expertise in practice/job analysis and certification exam development as reviewers of the methodologies and procedures for NCSBN's previous practice analysis studies. All three reviewers indicated that this methodology was psychometrically sound, legally defensible and in compliance with industry standards for practice analyses. Once a sound methodology has been validated and approved by an external panel of SMEs in the area of psychometrics and practice analysis methodologies, that methodology remains in effect until new procedures or methodologies are suggested. Should substantial changes to the methodology occur in future practice analyses, NCSBN Examinations staff shall ensure that a thorough review of the methodology is undertaken by external SMEs.

Panel of SMEs

A panel of eight SMEs was assembled to assist with the practice analysis. Seven panel members worked with, educated and/or supervised LPN/VNs who were within their first 12 months of practice; one panel member was newly licensed and represented newly licensed LPN/VNs. Panel members represented geographic areas of the U.S. jurisdictions, major nursing specialties and varied practice settings.

The panel used the current test plan category structure describing the types of activities performed by newly licensed LPN/VNs and developed a list of activities performed within each category of the structure.

Survey Development

A total of 154 nursing activity statements were incorporated into the practice analysis survey. The survey also included questions about the nurses' practice settings, past experiences and demographics. Six forms of the survey were created to reduce the number of activity statements on each survey and sent via the internet to a sample of newly licensed LPN/VNs. Four of the survey forms contained 26 activity statements each, and two survey forms contained 25 activity statements. Except for the activity statements unique to each survey form, the surveys were identical.

Survey Process

Sample Selection

A sample of 26,559 recipients was randomly selected from the candidates who passed the NCLEX-PN® examination from April 8, 2023, through Feb. 15, 2024.

Representativeness

The sample selected for this study was proportionally equivalent to the population from which the sample was drawn with respect to each NCSBN jurisdiction.

Emailing Procedure

Six forms of the survey were distributed evenly among 26,559 newly licensed LPN/VNs. A five-stage emailing process was used to engage respondents in the study. All potential respondents were promised confidentiality with regard to their participation and their responses. The survey was conducted from April through May 2024.

Return Rates

Out of the sample of 26,559 surveys sent, a total of 5,845 were returned (972 were returned from Form 1, 963 from Form 2, 974 from Form 3, 982 from Form 4, 957 from Form 5, and 997 from Form 6). A total of 221 surveys were identified as undeliverable. Therefore, the adjusted return rate was 22.2% for the survey. Of those who completed the survey, 1,069 individuals did not

qualify for survey ratings based on one of the following reasons: (a) They did not indicate having an LPN/VN license; (b) they were not currently working in the U.S.; (c) they were working fewer than 20 hours per week providing direct care to clients as an LPN/VN; and/or (d) they failed to answer the previous three demographic questions. After adjusting for incorrect addresses and removals, the analyzable response rate was 18.1%.

LPN/VN Practice Analysis Nonrespondent Study

In order to ensure the validity of the results, NCSBN conducted an email survey of nonrespondents to determine if those LPN/VNs not responding would have rated the survey activity statements differently. The nonrespondents rated the activity statements similarly to the respondents, which provides support for the validity of the survey results. When comparing the respondent and nonrespondent ratings, a few statements have variances in frequencies, possibly indicating that the activity statements carry a different frequency in certain practice settings. The importance and clinical judgment relevancy ratings remain comparable between these two groups.

Demographics, Experiences and Practice Environments of Participants

Demographics/Past Experiences

The majority of survey respondents (89.5%) indicated their gender as female. The average age of respondents was 34.6 years (SD = 9.9 years). Respondents indicated their racial/ethnic background as follows: 41.0% White, 34.9% Black or African American, 12.1% Hispanic and 7.1% Asian.

Respondents indicated working an average of 6.6 months as an LPN/VN in the U.S. and its territories. On average, LPN/VNs were 12.0 months post graduation. Most of the respondents (85.2%) were graduates of diploma LPN/VN programs, and 11.0% graduated from associate degree LPN/VN programs. Approximately 0.3% of survey respondents were educated outside of the U.S. Approximately 51% of survey respondents

reported experience working as a nurse aide for an average of 5.0 years.

Orientation

The majority of newly licensed LPN/VNs received some type of formal orientation; only 6.3% of respondents indicated that they did not receive formal orientation. Among respondents who had formal orientation, 2.5% reported having only classroom instruction or skills lab work for their orientation. The majority (65.9%) reported working with an assigned mentor or preceptor for an average of 4.8 weeks; 15.9% reported classroom and/ or skills lab plus performing supervised work with clients for an average of 4.0 weeks. Additionally, 6.2% reported having a formal internship that lasted an average of 8.0 weeks.

Certifications Earned

In the current study, Basic Life Support (94.8%), Intravenous Therapy (30.1%) and Advanced Cardiac Life Support (18.2%) were the most frequently reported certifications.

Facilities

The majority of newly licensed LPN/VNs in this study reported working in long-term care facilities (44.2%) or hospitals (25.6%), while 21.5% reported working in community-based or ambulatory care facilities.

Overall, the number of beds reported in employing facilities was most commonly distributed among fewer than 100 beds (33.7%), 100-299 beds (27.4%) and 500 or more beds (5.8%).

Respondents were roughly equally split between urban (40.3%), suburban (32.8%) and rural (26.9%) areas.

Practice Settings

Most frequently, LPN/VNs reported working in long-term care (44.2%) and rehabilitation (25.3%) settings. Other commonly reported settings include medical-surgical or any of its subspecialities (16.2%); ambulatory care, physician offices or clinics (13.2%); home health,

including visiting nurse associations (9.6%); and psychiatry or any of its subspecialties (6.9%).

Client Health Conditions and Ages

Newly licensed LPN/VNs reported caring most frequently for clients with stable chronic conditions (77.3%), clients with behavioral/emotional conditions (62.2%) and well clients (50.2%). Survey respondents could select more than one client condition category, resulting in a sum greater than 100%.

In terms of age, respondents most frequently reported caring for older adults aged 65 to 85 (81.9%), older adults over age 85 (62.8%) and adults aged 18 to 64 (62.5%). Survey respondents could select more than one client age category, resulting in a sum greater than 100%.

Shifts Worked

The shifts most commonly worked by newly licensed LPN/VNs were days (54.6%), nights (23.3%) and evenings (13.7%). Only a small percentage of respondents (6.6%) indicated they worked other types of shifts.

Time Spent in Different Categories of Nursing Activities

Newly licensed LPN/VNs reported spending the greatest amount of time in basic care and comfort (13.3%), pharmacological therapies (13.2%), physiological adaptation (13.2%), and safety and infection prevention (13.0%). Compared to the 2021 study, there was a slight decrease in time spent on activities related to safety and infection prevention.

Administrative Responsibilities/Primary Administrative Position

Of the respondents, 40.1% reported having administrative responsibilities, and of those respondents, 15.0% reported having a primary administrative position.

Enrollment in Registered Nurse Educational Programs

Of the respondents, 25.0% reported enrollment in a registered nurse (RN) educational program, and 23.7% reported that they had applied to such a program but were not currently enrolled.

Of those currently enrolled, 15.5% are in baccalaureate programs, 78.0% are in associate degree programs and 4.7% are in diploma programs. Of those who had applied but are not enrolled, 39.1% are completing prerequisite courses, 25.7% are on waiting lists, 21.8% cannot afford the tuition, 5.8% were turned away because classes were full and 4.6% failed to meet the program requirements. Respondents could select more than one reason for nonenrollment, resulting in a sum greater than 100%. There were also 31.9% of respondents who reported holding nonnursing college degrees.

Activity Performance Findings

Reliability

Reliability indices were calculated to assess the capability of the survey to measure the activities relevant to safe and effective practice of newly licensed LPN/VNs. Standardized Cronbach's alpha coefficients were calculated for frequency and importance ratings for each of the six survey forms. The forms had an average total reliability index of 0.94 for importance, 0.91 for frequency ratings and 0.93 for clinical judgment, which indicate strong reliability. These high reliability indices indicate the survey reliably measures the nursing activities necessary for competent LPN/VN practice.

SME Panel Validation of Survey Findings

The SME panel for the 2024 PN Practice Analysis was asked to provide independent ratings of the 154 activity statements. In general, the importance ratings of SMEs and survey respondents were somewhat similar; however, respondents regarded most of the activity statements as more important than the SMEs did.

Applicability of Activities to Practice Setting

Respondents indicated if each of the activities was applicable to their work setting. The activities ranged from 28.2% applicability (i.e., 28.2% reported that the activity was performed in their work setting) to 100%.

Frequency of Activity Performance

Respondents were asked to rate the frequency of performance of all activities that were applicable to their work settings on a six-point scale: "0 times" to "5 times or more." Average frequency statistics were calculated in two ways: setting-specific frequency of activity performance and total group frequency. Average setting-specific frequencies ranged from 1.89 to 4.86. Average total group frequencies ranged from 0.92 to 4.83.

Importance of Activity Performance

Respondents were asked to rate the importance of performing each nursing activity in regard to the maintenance of client safety and/or threat of complications or distress using a five-point scale: "1" (not important) to "5" (critically important). Average setting-specific importance ratings ranged from 3.99 to 4.89. Average total group importance ratings ranged from 3.39 to 4.86.

Clinical Judgment Relevancy of Activity Performance

Clinical judgment is defined as the observed outcome of critical thinking and decision-making. It is an iterative process that uses nursing knowledge to observe and assess presenting situations, identify a prioritized client concern, and generate the best possible evidence-based solutions in order to deliver safe client care.

Respondents were asked to rate the relevance of performing each nursing activity with regard to clinical judgment using a four-point scale: "1" (not relevant) to "4" (essential). Average setting-specific clinical judgment ratings ranged from 3.02 to 3.89. Average total group clinical judgment ratings ranged from 2.72 to 3.88.

Summary

Respondents to the 2024 PN Practice Analysis found the activities listed in the survey to be representative of the work they perform in their practice settings. In general, the importance ratings of SMEs and newly licensed LPN/VNs supported the results. The reliability of the survey instrument was quite good. Activities with the lowest average total group frequency and importance ratings corresponded, in general, to those activities performed in specialized areas of nursing practice. In addition, the correlation between total group importance and total group clinical judgment ratings is 0.97, indicating a strong relationship between the two ratings.

Conclusion

The 2024 PN Practice Analysis used several methods to describe the practice of newly licensed LPN/VNs in the U.S.: (1) document reviews; (2) activity logs of newly licensed LPN/VNs; (3) SMEs' knowledge; and (4) a large-scale survey. In addition, there was evidence to support the validity of the activity statement ratings. Based on evidence, the findings of this study can be used to evaluate and support an LPN/VN test plan.

BACKGROUND OF STUDY

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN®) is responsible to its members, the nursing regulatory bodies in the U.S. and its member board territories, for the preparation of psychometrically sound and legally defensible licensure examinations. The periodic performance of practice analysis (i.e., job analysis) studies assists NCSBN in evaluating the validity of the test plan that guides content distribution of the licensure examination. Furthermore, practice analysis studies have long been recognized by measurement and testing professions as important sources of validity evidence for licensure examinations (APA, AERA and NCME, 2014; Raymond, 2001). Because the U.S. health care industry is rapidly changing, practice analysis studies are traditionally conducted by NCSBN on a three-year cycle. The previous licensed practical/ vocational nurse (LPN/VN) practice analysis study was conducted in 2021.

Methodology

A number of steps are necessary to perform an analysis of newly licensed LPN/VN practice. This section provides a description of the methodology used to conduct the 2024 PN Practice Analysis survey. Descriptions of subject matter expert (SME) panel processes, survey development, sample selection and data collection procedures are provided, as well as information about assurance of confidentiality, response rate and the degree to which respondents were representative of the population of newly licensed LPN/VNs.

Preliminary Interviews with Nurse Leaders

In order to collect information about trends in nursing and health care and to anticipate possible changes in the future of nursing practice, a variety of leaders in the nursing profession were contacted regarding their opinions. The information that these nursing leaders provided was documented, and after leaders' identifying information was removed to provide anonymity, a

summary of the interviews was made available for the SME panel to consider when developing the activity statements. In addition, two NCSBN nursing staff members reviewed the results of the interviews, noting any themes or trends. This information was then provided for consideration when developing activity statements.

Methodology Reviewers

Three methodology reviewers were chosen for their expertise in practice/job analysis and certification exam development as reviewers of the methodologies and procedures for NCSBN's previous practice analysis studies. All three reviewers indicated that this methodology was psychometrically sound, legally defensible and in compliance with industry standards for practice analyses. Once a sound methodology has been validated and approved by an external panel of SMEs in the area of psychometrics and practice analysis methodologies, that methodology remains in effect until new procedures or methodologies are suggested. Should substantial changes to the methodology occur in future practice analyses, NCSBN Examinations staff shall ensure that a thorough review of the methodology is undertaken by external SMEs.

Panel of Subject Matter Experts (SMEs)

A panel of eight LPN/VNs and registered nurses (RNs) was assembled to assist with the practice analysis study. Seven panel members worked with, educated and/or supervised LPN/VNs who were within their first 12 months of practice; one panel member was newly licensed and represented newly licensed LPN/VNs. Panel members represented geographic NCSBN areas of the U.S. jurisdictions, major nursing specialties and varied practice settings. See **Appendix A** for a list of panel members.

The panel of experts performed several tasks crucial to the success of the practice analysis study. The SMEs were requested to ask at least four newly licensed LPN/VNs whom they worked with or supervised to submit activity logs describing the activities they performed on the job. Additionally, SMEs were asked to submit job descriptions, orientation and professional evaluations from their work setting. Using activity logs, past activity statements, job descriptions, performance evaluation documents, as well as their own knowledge of newly licensed LPN/VN practices, the panel members worked to create a list of activities performed within each category of the current test plan category structure. Each activity was reviewed for applicability to newly licensed practice and the relationship to the delivery of safe nursing care to the public. Care was taken to create the activity statements at approximately the same level of specificity and to avoid redundancy.

Survey Development

Several processes were used to create, evaluate and refine the survey instrument used for the 2024 PN Practice Analysis study. The activity statements created by the panel of experts were reviewed, edited and approved by the NCLEX® Examination Committee. The committee also approved the survey form. For this survey, internet-based versions were used.

There were 154 nursing activity statements that were incorporated into a practice analysis survey. The survey also included questions about the nurses' practice settings, past experiences and demographics. Six forms of the survey were created to reduce the number of activity statements on each survey. Four of the survey forms contained 26 activity statements each, and two survey forms contained 25 activity statements. Except for the activity statements unique to each survey form, the surveys were identical.

The survey contained six sections. In the first section, there were questions related to the type of nursing license held, working in the U.S. and direct care of clients. Activity statements were also included in this section. The second section contained questions about months of work experience as an LPN/VN, type and length of work orientation, and certifications earned. The third

section focused on work environment, including type and age of clients, employment setting, and type and size of facility. The fourth section requested information on the respondents' last day of work, including number of hours worked, number of clients for whom care was provided and the amount of time spent on various types of nursing activities. The fifth section pertained to basic demographic information. The sixth section provided space for respondents to write comments or suggestions about the study. All forms of the survey used in the 2024 PN Practice Analysis may be found in **Appendix B**.

Survey Process

Sample Selection

A sample of 26,559 recipients were randomly selected from the candidates who passed the NCLEX-PN® from April 8, 2023, through Feb. 15, 2024, and were not previously included in the 2024 PN Nursing Knowledge Survey. A total of 221 surveys were removed from the initial sample because they were undeliverable.

Representativeness

The sample selected for this study was proportionally equivalent to the population from which the sample was drawn with respect to each NCSBN jurisdiction. **Table 1** presents the correspondence between the population, the sample size and the respondents by NCSBN jurisdiction.

Emailing Procedure

Six forms of the survey were distributed evenly among 26,559 newly licensed LPN/VNs.

A five-stage mailing process was used to engage the respondents in the study. A presurvey email was sent to each individual selected for the sample in April 2024. One week later, recipients were sent an email invitation with the survey link. Two weeks later, a reminder email was sent to nonrespondents reiterating the importance of the study and urging participation. Approximately two weeks after the first email, a second reminder was sent

to nonrespondents, and two weeks later, a third email was sent to remaining nonrespondents. The survey was conducted from April through May 2024.

Confidentiality

All potential respondents were promised confidentiality regarding their participation and their responses. Files containing personally identifiable information (PII) were kept separate from the data files. The study protocol was reviewed and approved by NCSBN's CEO for compliance with organizational guidelines for research studies involving human subjects.

Return Rates

Out of the sample of 26,559 surveys sent, a total of 5,845 were returned (972 were returned from Form 1, 963 from Form 2, 974 from Form 3, 982 from Form 4, 957 from Form 5, and 997 from Form 6). A total of 221

surveys were identified as undeliverable. Therefore, the adjusted return rate was 22.2%. Of the 26,338 surveys sent, 5,845 respondents completed the survey. A total of 1,069 individuals did not qualify for survey ratings based on one of the following reasons: (a) They did not indicate having an LPN/VN license; (b) they were not currently working in the U.S.; (c) they were working fewer than 20 hours per week providing direct care to clients as an LPN/VN; and/or (d) they failed to answer the previous three demographic questions. After adjusting for incorrect addresses and removals, the analyzable response rate was 18.1%. See **Table 2** and **Table 3**.

PN Practice Analysis Nonrespondent Study

In order to ensure the validity of the results, NCSBN conducted an email survey of nonrespondents to determine if LPN/VNs not responding would have rated the survey activity statements differently than

the respondents. If there are no systematic differences in respondents versus nonrespondents, there would be further evidence signifying that the survey results are unbiased, which supports the validity of the 2024 PN Practice Analysis results. When comparing the respondent and nonrespondent ratings, a few statements have variances in frequencies, possibly indicating that the activity statements carry a different frequency in certain practice settings. The importance and clinical judgment relevancy ratings remain comparable between these two groups. See **Appendix I** for a full report of the nonrespondent study.

Summary

A panel of eight nurses, SMEs in the practice of newly licensed LPN/VNs, with one member representing newly licensed LPN/VNs, met and created a comprehensive list of LPN/VN activity statements. A survey was developed and revised before being sent to 26,559 newly licensed LPN/VNs selected from lists of candidates who passed the NCLEX-PN between April 8, 2023, and Feb. 15, 2024. The survey response rate was 18.1%. This practice analysis contains the responses of 4,776 newly licensed LPN/VNs.

DEMOGRAPHICS, EXPERIENCES AND PRACTICE ENVIRONMENTS OF PARTICIPANTS

Demographics/Past Experiences

Demographic information, including racial and ethnic backgrounds, educational preparation and gender, are presented below, followed by descriptions of respondents' work environments, including settings, shifts worked and client characteristics.


Age and Gender

The majority of newly licensed LPN/VNs (89.5%) indicated their gender as female, approximately the same percentage found in the 2021 survey (NCSBN, 2022). See **Figure 1** for gender. The age of respondent nurses averaged 34.6 years (SD = 9.9 years), similar to the average of 32.9 years from the 2021 survey.

Race/Ethnicity of Newly Licensed LPN/VNs

A total of 41.0% of respondents in the current study reported their race/ethnicity as White – not of Hispanic origin. Respondents also reported their race/ethnicity as follows: 34.9% Black or African American, 12.1% Hispanic and 7.1% Asian. See **Figure 2** for race/ethnicity reported by newly licensed LPN/VNs.

Of the respondents, 78.4% reported English as their primary language, and 17.2% reported both English and another language as their primary languages.





Educational Background

Newly licensed LPN/VNs indicated obtaining an LPN/VN diploma/certificate in the U.S. most frequently (85.2%). The second most frequently chosen response was an LPN/VN associate degree in the U.S. (11.0%). These numbers closely mirrored the proportions in the population from which the study sample was derived and follows the same educational diversity of past studies. See **Figure 3** for the respondents' educational background.

Average Months Since Graduation, Months Employed and Previous Nurse Aide Experience

Respondents reported working an average of 6.6 months as LPN/VNs in the U.S. and reported being an average of 12.0 months post graduation. **Figure 4** shows





the months since graduation and months employed for the 2024 and 2021 surveys. Approximately 51.0% of newly licensed LPN/VNs reported previous experience as a nurse aide, similar to the 2021 survey results. Respondents reported an average of 5.0 years of experience as a nurse aide, similar to the result from 2021. See **Table 4** for average years of nurse aide experience.



Orientation

The majority of newly licensed LPN/VNs (93.7%) indicated receiving some form of formal orientation. No formal orientation was reported by 6.3%, a notable decrease from 2021 (9.7%), and 2.5% reported having only classroom instruction or skills lab work for their orientation. Newly licensed LPN/VNs reported working with an assigned preceptor (65.9%) for an average of 4.8 weeks, and 15.9% reported performing classroom and/or skills lab plus supervised work with clients for an average

of approximately 4.0 weeks. A formal internship that lasted an average of 8.0 weeks was reported by 6.2%, compared to 2.3% with 4.0 weeks in 2021. See **Table 5** for type and length of orientation.

Certifications Earned

In the current study, 96.7% of respondents reported earning additional certifications or completing coursework compared to 90.5% of 2021 respondents. Basic Life Support (94.8%), Intravenous Therapy (30.1%) and Advanced Cardiac Life Support (18.2%) were the most frequently reported certifications. See **Table 6** for a complete list of additional coursework and/or certifications completed. To compare with 2024, 2021 results have been recalculated by excluding the missing responses. Survey respondents could select more than one certification, resulting in a sum greater than 100%.

Work Settings

Facilities

The highest proportion of newly licensed LPN/VNs (44.2%) reported working in long-term care facilities, while 25.6% reported working in a hospital. Only 21.5% reported working in community-based or ambulatory care facilities/organizations. Compared to the 2021 survey, there was an increase in the percentage of newly licensed LPN/VNs working in hospital settings and a decrease in long-term care and community-based or ambulatory care facilities/organizations. See **Table 7** for employment facilities.

Overall, the number of beds reported in hospitals or nursing homes was most commonly distributed among 100-299 beds (27.4%) and 50-99 beds (22.6%). Similar to the results from the 2021 survey, a small percentage of respondents worked in facilities with 300 or more beds; 5.2% worked in facilities with 300-499 beds, and only 5.8% worked in facilities with 500 beds or more.

About the same number of newly licensed LPN/VNs reported working in urban or metropolitan areas (40.3%) and suburban areas (32.8%), while 26.9% of respondents

work in rural areas. Data for the size and location of the facilities where respondents reported working are shown in **Table 8**.

Practice Settings

Newly licensed LPN/VNs reported working in longterm care most frequently (44.2%), which was a 3.8% decrease from the 2021 findings. Rehabilitation was reported by 25.3% of respondents; 16.2% reported

working in a medical-surgical setting (an increase of 7.9% from 2021); and 13.2% reported working in ambulatory care, physician offices or clinics. See **Table 9** for practice settings. To compare with 2024, 2021 results have been recalculated by excluding the missing responses.

Client Health Conditions

Newly licensed LPN/VNs reported caring for clients with stable chronic conditions (77.3%), clients with behavioral/emotional conditions (62.2%), well clients (50.2%), clients at end of life (45.0%) and clients with acute conditions (44.9%). These results are somewhat similar to those from the 2021 survey. See **Figure 5** for client conditions. To compare with 2024, 2021 results have been recalculated by excluding the missing responses. Survey respondents could select more than one client condition, resulting in a sum greater than 100%.

Client Ages

The majority of newly licensed LPN/VNs reported that on their last day of work prior to completing the survey they were caring for adults aged 65 to 85 (81.9%), adults aged 85 and older (62.8%) and adults aged 18 to 64


(62.5%). Only 18.5% of respondents reported caring for pediatric clients aged 0 to 17. See **Figure 6** for client ages. To compare with 2024, 2021 results have been recalculated by excluding the missing responses. Survey respondents could select more than one client age, resulting in a sum greater than 100%.


On average, the respondents were responsible for 20.8 clients on their last workday with a standard deviation of 28.0.


Shifts Worked

The shifts most commonly worked by newly licensed LPN/VNs were days (54.6%), nights (23.3%) and evenings (13.7%). Only 6.6% of respondents reported working rotating shifts. See **Figure 7** for shifts reported. Note that 1.8% selected "other" for shifts worked and that these responses are not reflected in **Figure 7**.

On a typical workday, the majority of the respondents (46.2%) worked a 12-hour shift, while 36.2% worked an 8-hour shift and 5.6% worked a 10-hour shift.







Time Spent in Different Categories of Nursing Activities

Respondents were asked to record the numbers of hours they spent performing specific categories of activities (see **Table 10**). The hours spent were then converted to proportions of time by dividing the hours spent on each activity by the number of hours spent working. Because nurses often perform multiple activities simultaneously, such as reinforcing teaching while giving medications or providing emotional support while giving routine care, the sum of proportions was greater than one. To make the proportions of time spent in activities useful to the task of helping to

validate the NCLEX-PN® test plan, the proportions were standardized by dividing the time spent in each category of activity by the sum of hours spent in all the activities. These standardized proportions have the advantage of adding up to one. Newly licensed LPN/VNs reported spending the greatest amount of time in basic care and comfort (13.3%), pharmacological therapies (13.2%), physiological adaptation (13.2%), and safety and infection prevention (13.0%). The least amount of time was reportedly spent on reduction of risk potential (12.8%), psychosocial integrity (12.4%), health promotion and maintenance (12.0%), and coordinated care (10.1%). Compared to the 2021 study, there was a slight variation

in time spent on one category of activities. There was a slight decrease in time spent on activities related to safety and infection prevention (from 14.1% to 13.0%).

Administrative Responsibilities/Primary Administrative Position

The newly licensed LPN/VNs responding to the practice analysis survey were asked if they had administrative responsibilities in their nursing position. Of all respondents, 40.1% reported having such responsibilities, and of those, 15.0% reported having a primary administrative position. The percentage of individuals who reported such responsibilities varies by type of employing facility. LPN/VNs working in long-term care facilities were much more likely to report having administrative responsibilities than those working in other settings (58.4% in long-term care compared to 14.5% in hospitals). In addition, LPN/VNs working in long-term care with administrative responsibilities

were slightly more likely to report being in a primary administrative position than those working in hospitals (13.7% in long-term care facilities compared to 10.3% in hospitals). Of the LPN/VNs working in community-based settings, 32.5% reported having administrative responsibilities with 19.5% of those reporting holding a primary administrative position. Compared to 2021, the results represent a slight decrease overall in administrative responsibilities (from 43.4% to 40.1%) and a significant decrease in newly licensed LPN/VNs holding primary administrative positions. See **Table 11** for detailed results of administrative responsibilities.

Enrollment in RN Educational Programs

Respondents were asked about enrollment in further nursing education. Approximately 25.0% of respondents reported enrollment in a registered nurse (RN) educational program, and 23.7% reported that they had applied to such a program but were not

currently enrolled. Of those currently enrolled, 78.0% were in associate degree programs, 15.5% were in baccalaureate degree programs, 4.7% were in diploma programs and 1.8% selected other. Of those who applied but were not enrolled, 39.1% were completing prerequisite courses, 25.7% were on waiting lists, 23.0%

selected other, 21.8% were unable to afford tuition, 5.8% were turned away because classes were full and 4.6% failed to meet program requirements. Additionally, 31.9% of respondents reported holding nonnursing college degrees. See **Table 12** for education program enrollment.

Summary

The newly licensed LPN/VNs responding to the 2024 PN Practice Analysis survey were primarily female with an average age of 34.6 years. The majority worked day, night or evening shifts in long-term care or rehabilitation settings. The majority were provided with an orientation with an assigned preceptor or mentor for an average of 4.8 weeks. The respondents cared mostly for clients with stable chronic conditions who were 65 to 85 years of age.

ACTIVITY STATEMENT PERFORMANCE FINDINGS

Findings relative to the activities performed by licensed practical nurses/vocational nurses (LPN/VNs) who are newly licensed are presented in this section of the report. The methods used to collect and analyze activity statement findings, applicability to practice settings, frequency of performance, importance of the activities and relevance to clinical judgment are discussed. A validation of survey findings with estimates provided by the subject matter expert (SME) panel is also provided.

Overview of Methods

The 2024 PN Practice Analysis survey asked respondents to answer three questions about each activity statement. Question A addressed the frequency of activity performance. The scale of frequency ranged from "never performed in work setting" to "5 or more times." Respondents were instructed to mark "never performed in work setting" if an activity did not apply to their work setting and then move to the next activity. If the activity did apply to their work setting, they were asked to mark on a six-point scale of "0 times" to "5 times or more," reflecting the frequency with which they had performed the activity on their last day of work. In question B, respondents were then asked to rate the overall importance of the activity considering client safety and/or threat of complications or distress on a scale of 1 to 5 with 1 being "not important" and 5 being "critically important." In question C, the relevance to clinical judgment when performing the nursing

activity was addressed. The respondents could choose from four ratings: "1" (not relevant)," "2" (helpful), "3" (important) or "4" (essential). Each activity statement's applicability to practice setting was assessed by analyzing the number of respondents having performed each activity statement, excluding those that were marked "never performed."

Activity Performance Characteristics

Reliability

Reliability indices were calculated to assess the survey's capability to measure the activities relevant to safe and effective practice of newly licensed LPN/VNs.

Standardized Cronbach's alpha coefficients were calculated for frequency and importance ratings for the forms of the survey to measure the internal consistency of the instrument (Cronbach, 1951). Alpha coefficients range from 0 to 1; a value of 0.70 or greater is generally considered adequate. The forms had an average total reliability index of 0.91 for frequency ratings, 0.94 for importance and 0.93 for clinical judgment. **Table 13** shows that the data suggest strong evidence for the reliability of the measured outcomes in this survey.

Subject Matter Expert (SME) Panel Validation of Survey Findings

The SME panel for the 2024 PN Practice Analysis survey was asked to provide independent ratings of the 154

activity statements. SMEs estimated the percentage of newly licensed LPN/VNs performing the activities within their practice setting, the average setting-specific frequency with which the activities were performed during one day, the average importance of the activities and the average relevance of clinical judgment to the activities. After the ratings were obtained, average total group frequency estimates were calculated by prorating the setting-specific frequencies with the estimates of setting applicability. All panel ratings were averaged across panel members and compared to the ratings obtained from the practice analysis survey. The importance ratings estimated by the panel members were compared to the average importance ratings from the practice analysis survey. Table 14 illustrates that there were no differences greater than 1.13 with respect to importance between the SME ratings and the newly licensed LPN/VNs. In general, the importance ratings of SMEs and survey respondents were somewhat similar; however, respondents rated most of the activity statements as more important than the SMEs did.

Applicability of Activities to Practice Setting

The percentages of newly licensed LPN/VNs indicating that the activities were applicable are included in **Table 15.** The activities ranged from 28.2% applicability (i.e., 28.2% of the respondents reported that the activity was performed in their work setting) to 100%. The activities with the lowest percentage of applicability were "Assist with monitoring a client in labor" (28.2%), "Provide care that meets the needs of the newborn less than 1 month old through the infant or toddler client through 2 years" (31.2%) and "Identify signs or symptoms of potential prenatal complication" (32.3%). The activities with the highest percentage of applicability for respondents were "Maintain client confidentiality" (100%), "Organize and prioritize care based on client needs" (99.8%) and "Recognize selflimitations and seek assistance when needed (e.g., tasks, assignments)" (99.8%).

Frequency of Activity Performance

Respondents were asked to rate the frequency of performance of all activities that were applicable to their work setting. Newly licensed LPN/VNs reported how frequently they performed the activity on the last day they worked using a six-point scale: "0 times" to "5 times or more." Average frequency statistics were calculated in two ways: setting-specific and total group. The setting-specific frequency was calculated by averaging the frequency ratings of those respondents providing ratings (i.e., respondents indicating that the activity applied to their work setting). The total group frequency was calculated by including the missing frequency ratings (i.e., respondents indicating that the activity did not apply to their work setting) before averaging the rating. To perform this calculation, the missing frequency ratings were converted to zero ("0 times" on the rating scale) for inclusion in the total group frequency calculation. See **Table 15** for setting-specific and total group frequency.

Setting-Specific

Average setting-specific frequencies ranged from 1.89 to 4.86. The activities performed with the lowest frequencies were "Recognize and report staff conflict" (1.89), "Respond and intervene to a client life-threatening situation (e.g., cardiopulmonary resuscitation)" (2.25) and "Monitor transfusion of blood product" (2.30). The activities with the highest setting-specific average frequencies of performance were "Provide care within the legal scope of practice" (4.86); "Practice in a manner consistent with code of ethics for nurses" (4.84) and "Verify the identity of client" (4.82). **Appendix C** presents activity statements rank ordered by average setting-specific frequency.

Total Group

Average total group frequencies ranged from 0.92 to 4.83. The activities performed with the lowest total group frequency were "Assist with monitoring a client in labor" (0.92), "Provide care that meets the needs of

the newborn less than 1 month old through the infant or toddler client through 2 years" (0.95) and "Monitor transfusion of blood product" (0.98). Those activities performed with the overall highest frequencies were "Provide care within the legal scope of practice" (4.83), "Practice in a manner consistent with code of ethics for nurses" (4.81) and "Maintain client confidentiality" (4.80). Appendix D presents activity statements rank ordered by average total group frequency.

Importance of Activity Performance

Respondents were asked to rate the importance of performing each nursing activity in terms of client safety, namely risk of unnecessary complications, impairment

of function or serious distress to clients. Importance ratings were recorded using a five-point scale of "1" (not important) to "5" (critically important). Average importance ratings were calculated in two ways: setting-specific and total group. Setting-specific importance was calculated by averaging only the ratings of respondents providing frequency ratings for the activity statement (LPN/VNs indicating that the activity applied to their work setting). The total group importance was calculated by including all importance ratings regardless of applicability to work setting. The average importance rating for each of the 154 activities is included in Table 16.

Setting-Specific

Average setting-specific importance ratings ranged from 3.99 to 4.89. The activities with the lowest importance ratings were "Follow up with client after discharge" (3.99), "Participate in client referral process" (4.01), and "Participate in client group session" (4.03). The activities with the highest importance ratings were "Follow the rights of medication administration" (4.89), "Verify the identity of client" (4.85) and "Maintain medication safety practices (e.g., storage, checking for expiration dates, compatibility)" (4.85). Appendix E presents activity statements rank ordered by average setting-specific importance ratings.

Total Group

Average total group importance ratings ranged from 3.39 to 4.86. The activities with the lowest importance ratings were "Follow up with client after discharge" (3.39), "Participate in client group session" (3.56) and "Provide care that meets the needs of the newborn less than 1 month old through the infant or toddler client through 2 years" (3.68). The activities with the overall highest importance ratings were "Follow the rights of medication administration" (4.86), "Maintain client confidentiality" (4.84), "Verify the identity of client" (4.84) and "Provide care within the legal scope of practice" (4.84). Appendix F presents activity statements rank ordered by average total group importance ratings.

Clinical Judgment Relevancy of Activity Performance

Clinical judgment is defined as the observed outcome of critical thinking and decision-making. It is an iterative process that uses nursing knowledge to observe and assess presenting situations, identify a prioritized client concern and generate the best possible evidence-based solutions in order to deliver safe client care.

Respondents were asked to rate the relevance of performing each nursing activity with regard to clinical judgment. Clinical judgment relevancy ratings were recorded using a four-point scale of "1" (not relevant)

to "4" (essential). Average clinical judgment relevance ratings were calculated in two ways: setting-specific and total group. Setting-specific clinical judgment relevance was calculated by averaging only the ratings of respondents who provided frequency ratings for the activity statements (LPN/VNs indicating that the activity applied to their work setting). The total group clinical judgment relevance was calculated by including all clinical judgment relevance ratings regardless of applicability to work setting. The average clinical judgment relevance rating for each of the 154 activities is included in **Table 17**.

Setting-Specific

Average setting-specific clinical judgment relevance ratings ranged from 3.02 to 3.89. The activities with the lowest clinical judgment relevance ratings were "Recognize and report staff conflict" (3.02), "Follow up with client after discharge" (3.21) and "Participate in client group session" (3.24). The activities with the highest clinical judgment relevance ratings were "Follow the rights of medication administration" (3.89), "Respond and intervene to a client life-threatening situation (e.g., cardiopulmonary resuscitation)" (3.86) and "Provide care within the legal scope of practice" (3.85). Appendix G presents activity statements rank ordered by average setting-specific clinical judgment ratings.

Total Group

Average total group clinical judgment relevance ratings ranged from 2.72 to 3.88. The activities with the lowest clinical judgment relevance ratings were "Follow up with client after discharge" (2.72), "Participate in client group session" (2.90) and "Assist with care for the antepartum client" (2.95). The activities with the highest clinical judgment relevance ratings were "Follow the rights of medication administration" (3.88), "Provide care within the legal scope of practice" (3.85), "Collect required data prior to medication administration (e.g., contraindications, current medications)" (3.79), "Monitor and evaluate client vital signs (e.g., oxygen saturation, blood pressure)" (3.79), "Practice in a manner consistent

with code of ethics for nurses" (3.79) and "Recognize and report change in client condition" (3.79). **Appendix H** presents activity statements rank ordered by average total group clinical judgment ratings.

Summary

Respondents to the 2024 PN Practice Analysis survey found the activities listed in the survey to be representative of the work they performed in their practice setting. In general, the importance ratings of SMEs and newly licensed LPN/VNs supported the results. The reliability of the survey instrument was quite good. Consistent with the 2021 study, activities with the lowest average total group frequency and importance ratings corresponded, in general, to those activities performed in specialized areas of nursing practice. In addition, the correlation between total group importance and total group clinical judgment ratings is 0.97, indicating a strong relationship between the two ratings.

Conclusions

The 2024 PN Practice Analysis study used several methods to describe the practice of newly licensed LPN/VNs in the U.S.: (1) document reviews; (2) activity logs of newly licensed LPN/VNs; (3) SMEs' knowledge; and (4) a large-scale survey. There was evidence to support the validity of the activity statement ratings. Based on evidence, the findings of this study can be used to evaluate and support a PN test plan.

APPENDIX I: 2024 PN PRACTICE ANALYSIS NONRESPONDENT STUDY

Introduction

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN®) conducts practice analysis studies every three years to assess the practice environment and emerging practice changes. Although the 2024 PN Practice Analysis had an adequate analyzable response rate of approximately 18.1%, many individuals did not respond to the survey. Out of the 26,559 licensed practical nurses/vocational nurses (LPN/VNs) who were newly licensed and invited to take the survey, 5,845 returned the survey. NCSBN wanted to contact a sample of the invitees who chose not to participate in the survey and compare a sample of activity statements and demographic information against the 2024 PN Practice Analysis survey respondents.

Background of Study

NCSBN is responsible to its members, the nursing regulatory bodies in the U.S. and its member board territories, for the preparation of psychometrically sound and legally defensible licensure examinations. The periodic performance of practice analysis (i.e., job analysis) studies assists NCSBN in evaluating the validity of the test plan that guides content distribution of the licensure examination.

Findings from the 2024 PN Practice Analysis
Nonrespondent Study will provide possible reasons why
individuals do not participate in surveys and differences
between survey respondents and nonrespondents to
determine if the nonrespondents were systematically
different in terms of demographics and ratings of
the activity statements. This study was conducted to
determine if the results for the practice analysis were
somehow biased.

Methodology

Sample Selection

A random sample of newly licensed LPN/VNs who were invited but did not respond to the 2024 PN Practice Analysis survey were contacted via email. The sample was derived from the 26,559 invitees who were emailed the 2024 PN Practice Analysis survey. A total of 103 LPN/VNs from this sample completed the email survey.

Survey Instrument and Process

Nonrespondents were contacted via email. The nonrespondents were first asked about their reasons for not completing the survey. In order to facilitate the gathering of data from nonrespondents, a list of possible reasons was developed as to why invitees may not have responded to the survey based on prior research. Possible reasons included the following: "too busy," "did not care," "do not like/trust surveys," "did not receive," or "other." Second, individuals were asked demographic information in order to provide background on nonrespondents, including employment setting and specialty. Finally, nonrespondents were asked to rate the frequency of performance, importance and clinical judgment of 10 activities that were listed in the 2024 PN Practice Analysis survey. Nonrespondents were thanked for their time, and the data collected were recorded.

Nonrespondent Results

Reasons for Not Responding

Reasons provided by the nonrespondent LPN/VNs included "too busy" (66 responses or 64.1%), "did not receive" (22 responses or 21.4%), "other" (8 responses or 7.8%), "do not like/trust surveys" (4 responses or 3.9%) and "did not care" (3 responses or 2.9%).

Months Since Graduation

Nonrespondents were asked how long it has been since they graduated from a nursing program.

Nonrespondents indicated an average of 8.2 months of work experience, while respondents averaged 6.6 months. Overall, nonrespondents averaged a longer time in their position compared to original survey respondents because they were contacted one month or more after the 2024 PN Practice Analysis was completed.

Employment Setting and Specialty

Nonrespondents were asked to provide their nursing employment setting and specialty. The different settings and specialties were well represented in this sample. The largest percentage (28.2% or 29 nonrespondents) worked in long-term care facilities. Inpatient medical-surgical units were also frequently cited (23.3% or 24 nonrespondents). These results are similar to the 2024 PN Practice Analysis survey, which also identified that the largest percentage of nonrespondents worked in long-term care facilities (44.2%). See **Table I.1**.

Importance Ratings

In general, the importance ratings between nonrespondents and respondents were very similar, with no activity statement importance rating differing by more than one point. See **Table 1.2**.

Frequency Ratings

Frequency ratings provided by the nonrespondents were compared to the average response ratings of the 2024 PN Practice Analysis survey respondents. Overall, the frequency ratings were somewhat similar. Five activity statement frequency ratings between nonrespondents and respondents were more than one point, possibly indicating that the activity statements carry a different frequency in certain practice settings. See **Table I.3**.

Clinical Judgment Ratings

Clinical judgment ratings between nonrespondents and respondents were also very similar. No activity statements for clinical judgment had more than a one-point difference between nonrespondents and respondents. See **Table 1.4**.

Summary

The nonrespondent study suggests that the main reasons individuals did not complete the 2024 PN Practice Analysis survey were they were either too busy or did not receive it. In summary, most of the activity statement ratings were very similar, which indicates that the results of the survey are not systematically biased. The nonrespondent study provides support for the validity of the 2024 PN Practice Analysis results.
